# CHRISTIAN NEW TRAFFIC SERVICE IS REGULATIONS GREATEST NEED ARE DISCUSSED

### Speakers appeal for Consecration at Trinity Church Mass Meeting.

There are many people who consider themselves Christians but who are abominable people to live with because they are selfish. Christ is their Saviour they believe but in their lives it is all self," Rev. R. A. Armstrong, D.D., of Toronto said at a meeting of praise and consecration at Trinity United Church last evening. "If God's spirit gets control of us we'll do something about the need to supply not only their material needs but their spiritual needs," the speaker continued. "If you are led by the spirit of Christ you will go out and minister to the spiritual needs of the people around you—needs of which you have no conception."

The meeting was addressed also by Rev. J. P. Thomson of Toronto, who declared that the evangelization of Canadian life was "the task not only of the ministers but of every member of the church for we are workers together in the cause of Jesus Christ."

The first thing that is needed is true conversion, which is not a question of making new resolutions to live a better life. It means a great deal more than that. Then, too, the speaker said, "we must seek to become like Christ, and to remember that while we are in the world we are not of the world."

There must also be a thoroughness in the service of God. If the church were not a Divine institution it would have been out of business long ago. "We give to God the tag end of the day, go to church on Sunday, put a quarter in the collection plate and feel that we have discharged our Christian obligations."

Last night's meeting concluded the special meetings in Charlottetown in connection with the evangelization of Canadian life campaign. Assisting at the service were Rev. Hugh Miller, pastor of Trinity Church and Rev. H. D. Raymond, rector of St. Paul's church. Rev. J. A. Ramsay, D.D., of Moncton, representing the United Church on the evangelization team was unavoidably absent from last night's meeting.

Rev. Dr. Armstrong took as the text of his sermon the words of St. Paul, "The glorious liberty of the children of God." When the question of service to God arises some say "I can't do very much. We should not despise the amount we can do. Some Christians need to look at themselves carefully in the matter of service," the speaker declared. "When we give spiritually our capacity for spirituality increases."

The first liberty of the children of God, the speaker said, was freedom from sin. "We, all of us, have sins from which we need to be saved. Let's not fool ourselves. Perhaps we have no great sin but we have respectable sins."

Children of God find freedom from fear, which is rampant among all peoples. "We fear everything, for our jobs, our business, our children, the future. A live dynamic Christian has no fear of anything or anyone."

The third freedom of the children of God is freedom of speech, freedom to speak up anywhere and say a word for Jesus.

In conclusion Dr. Armstrong made an appeal that members of the congregations as well as the ministers be on the teams that go to the other points in Prince Edward Island to carry on the work of the campaign. "You must be the preachers and the witnesses if all men and women are to be reached for Christ," Rev. Dr. Armstrong declared.

Rev. Mr. Thomson in his sermon pointed out that in the service of God there is work for all whatever one's gifts might be. In no other organization in the world can so many different talents be used as in the church of Jesus Christ. There is no business that pays such dividends as that of winning immortal souls for Christ.

"Let us consecrate ourselves for him and go out wholeheartedly to

### Cheese Factory Has Successful Year

The Grand River Cheese Factory has just closed down for the winter months. This factory is one of the few cheese factories left on Prince Edward Island and this year has been a very successful one. Good prices were received for cheese and the farmers also received a good price for their milk.

The factory is a co-operative concern run under the very efficient management of Mr. Fred Larkin. When the factory is running about seven or eight large cheeses are turned out every day. More could be manufactured if more milk was available. The factory expects to open again in the spring when more and better business is expected.

The manufacture of cheese was once a flourishing industry of Prince Edward Island and it is hoped that the business will return and factories now closed down all together will open up next spring.—S.

thetic sailors' strikes. Port Arthur reported 250 seamen voted to strike.

At Vancouver Union officials said the strike was not expected to affect British Columbia ports. Shipping men believed the tie-up might divert traffic to the coast province.

White House officials said President Roosevelt was keeping in close touch with the situation, although he had not intervened personally so far.

**Violence Reported**

First violence was reported from San Pedro, Calif., the port of Los Angeles. John Wright, 41, said four men beat him because he had no union card.

Secretary of Labor Perkins, in Buffalo, N.Y., on a campaign speaking trip, endeavored by telephone to get the unions and ship owners to resume negotiations.

Edward McGrady, assistant secretary of labor and the Administration's number one "trouble-shooter," reported to the Department by telephone from San Francisco that he, too, hoped to have negotiations resumed.
