Kensington was in a gay mood yesterday the occasion being the autumn races of the Kensington Driving Park Association conducted by prominent citizens of the town. The fact that Kensington always puts on a first class race meet and big purses was the cause of bringing a big gathering together and a big array of fast horses. The races were four in number the race between Peter Farren 2.07 1/4 Maritime champion and record holder and Our Colonel 2.03 1/4 being an added attraction. As at all the race meets this year the best of order prevailed and people from abroad spoke the very complimentary regarding the prosperous appearance of the race goers. It is certainly sure that this province can gather thousands of people to its races dressed in excellent taste and brought there in turnouts or automobiles which show evidence of material prosperity.

The officials handling the races were most satisfactory and throughout the days racing there was not the slightest friction. In the match race an effort was made to break the Island record but Peter Farren although pacing in 2.09 1/4 at Sussex two weeks ago could not better 2.14 yesterday.

The race between Our Colonel and Peter created great interest but only once did it look like the Colonel's race in the second heat. In the others Peter showed that he was the undisputed champion. Mr. O'Keefe has now added to his collection the scalp of the Island's fastest and is going abroad new world's conqueror. "Hilda S." a great favorite paced a remarkable race winning her first heat in 2.16 1/4. Mr. Conroy is certainly to be congratulated on the way he has conditioned her in her tenth campaign. "The Abegweit" went a surprising race in the 2.25 pace beating the almost invincible John R. in straight heats.

The 2.40 stake went to Tindle Semple's Dongola a very shifty pacer the runner up being Mac Cresceus. In all the events the racing was keen and the second third and even fourth horses were "right there" at the finish and another turn of the racing wheel will probably show some of
