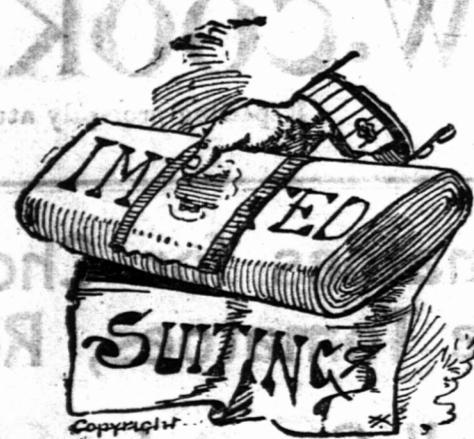

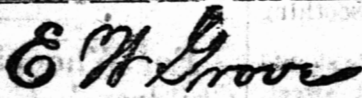

## CANADIAN LETTERS.

Not One Half of Them Go Through The Mails.

From returns sent in by the paper makers. The Dominion statisticians finds that the number of envelopes used during the last year in Canada, was 305,100,000 of which 272,400,000 were manufactured in the country and 32,600,000 imported making about 90 home-made in every 100 used. There were about 53 envelopes used for each individual of the whole population. The post office statistics show that there were 150,575,000 letters posted during last year in the 9,420 post offices of Canada, or an average of over 23 letters for each man, woman and child in Canada.

A comparison of the post office returns with the manufacturers' returns brings out the fact that less than one-half of the envelopes used go through the post office. The remainder is used to shill from impertinent perusal letters despatched by hand orders to the butcher, the grocer and shopkeepers generally billets doux which their senders, in the impatience, think require more speed than the post office, gives, invitations to those "gibble-gabble, gobble, git functions, called five o'clock teas;" solicitations for pecuniary aid to the one hundred and one affairs, musical and others, which assant one's pocket book with as pertinacity equal to that of Labrador mosquitoes bent on a blood-drawing forage; kindly or urgent duns for money due and over; gracefully worded requests for loans of the "ready" to tide over unforeseen emergencies, etc.

Notwithstanding the great convenience of the post office and the length of time it has been ministering to our wants and notwithstanding the cheapness and sureness with which it conveys the letters entrusted to its care, fully one-half of the epistolary correspondence of the Canadian people is carried on by agencies altogether outside of the post office, including the bicycle.

If the Postmaster General could only bag the carrying of those 155 million letters that now escape the Briarean collector, the post office, he could reduce the rate very considerably. It is a full reservoir of large dimensions, waiting to be tapped by our statesmen. Why, at half a cent a letter it would add three-quarters of a million dollars to the yearly revenue of the post office.

## AT REDUCED RATES.

TORONTO, Sept. 27.—The Ontario department of agriculture has been notified by the Canadian Pacific railway freight managers that carloads of pure bred stock will be carried from this province to British Columbia at \$150 per car and for long palace horse cars \$225 per car. This is a reduction of \$50 all round. The British Columbia government is working in with the Ontario Live Stock association to improve the breed of cattle and swine in the Pacific province. A car load of dairy cattle was recently sent from Ontario and sold by auction in the markets of British Columbia. Other consignments will soon be shipped.
