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SAINTS COMPLETELY OUTCLASSED BY DALHOUSIE TIGERS SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Red and White Legion go Down to a 14 to Nil Defeat Before Heavier and More Experienced Opponents—Abegweits Confident of Holding Fast and Heady "Bengals" This Afternoon.

Hats off to Dalhousie—the fastest and cleverest aggregation of pigskin jugglers that it has been our pleasure to give the once over in a goodly number of years.

Some of the old timers of not less than twenty years ago, who have not seen a game for ever so long, were led by curiosity and perhaps a little of the old spirit, to see Dal perform against her sister university, old St. Dunstan's—opinions flew right and left, on the bleachers, up and down the line, and the verdict was unanimous—the "Tigers" have one sweet little football team.

We also doff our "Kellies" to the Saints—although completely outclassed, outplayed and outwitted in every department, this scrappy young bunch of huskies have nothing to reproach themselves for; they are a credit to their Alma Mater, for notwithstanding the great barrier before them, they carried on, backing, scrumming, tackling and plunging and always on the defensive, they fought the black and gold, conquerors of the Wanderers, to the final whistle—"Let's continue."

Bracketing a terrific bombardment upon their inexperienced and lighter opponents, the fighting Tigers from Dalhousie University threw a monkey wrench in the Abegweits' progress.

gweit dope works, by defeating the St. Dunstan's 14 to nil in their initial appearance of a two-game series with the above-mentioned teams.

Hopelessly outplayed, and on the defensive after the first five minutes of the game, the red and white clan didn't have as much chance as a blind man trying to walk a tight wire, as the black and gold line-ups had the Saints all figured out, before the set-to was fair; by under way, nevertheless the game was productive of a great exhibition of good clean rugby, with the best of feelings prevailing throughout the entire stanza.

Dal scored in both periods; one touch in the first and three times in the second, and the second was converted. Every score came as a brilliant march down the field with Bates, McDonald, McOdram, Langwith and Capt. Monty Haslam ripping the red and white line to ribbons for gains of 25 and 30 yards at a lick. Once and only once did the local collegians have a chance to break the bubble. This was in the last half when Gavin, one of the Saints' hard-working forwards, intercepted a pass on Dal's 20-yard line, and bucked and plunged his way through what looked like a try, but "Unk" Fraser, Dal's speedy full back, embraced him just outside the touch line; Langwith with a timely touch kick for a 20-yard gain. After that boot there was nothing to it, and for practically the remainder of the contest, Dal territory and St. Dunstan's were entire strangers.

That the Tiger squad lived up through the last letter and semi-colon to all the glowing reports that had come across the Strait concerning its prowess, is a foregone conclusion. It played hard and heady football, with a finish seldom if ever seen here on a local gridiron. Its defence was as tight as Maggie is now with Jiggs, and its offence was a revelation.

Execute the bouquets—its backfield work was the true poetry of motion. There was no lost energy, no halting or stumbling. Every man was assigned to a particular task and every man took care of his job. The attack on the back line, with seven men at times, was a knifing rather than a crashing one. One of the outstanding features was that no matter how far the carrier was through the line, there was always still one man behind him to receive the pass as the filling-in process continued.

There is no denying the fact that the Saints played hard and rugged football, but against a team with a big edge in weight and experience like Dalhousie, it developed into a question of how many times would the visitors cross their opponents' touch-line or counters before the final whistle.

The Dal team were all stars Saturday, but outstanding among those were Capt. Monty Haslam and Langwith, a combination that was a terror to the Saints at all times.

For the red and white line-up, the backing of Joe Sullivan and Ed. Gillis on the half line, also the kicking of Gallant, and the scrappy work of Gavin on the front, no doubt was greatly responsible in holding the score at 14 instead of mounting higher.

That the Saints were completely trimmed to a nicety is certain, and it now remains to be seen just what the Abegweits will do after the fighting "Bengals" this afternoon.

the locals are forced to rouse. This was only a brief reprieve, for the Saints, for shortly afterwards, Monty Haslam on a pass towards the Saints' touch-line for the first try of the game. It was a nice piece of work, and a straight arm was used to advantage. He failed to convert. This was the only score made in this half, although Dal came near to repeating on three other occasions. The Saints were again forced to touch for safety before the half ended.

Second Period

This half opened with Dal once more taking the offensive when Bates receives Joe Sullivan's return kick, goes for a gain, then passes to Langwith for a kick in the scrum up Joe Fleming receiving ball and breezes through for neutral territory, getting a kick in before being hauled down. Play now centred around middle field for a short interval. The visitors' scrum were working to great advantage, the ball coming out on their end most of the time, Sutherland takes a pass out and with the assistance of Bates and Haslam forces the red and white boys to hand over 25 yards of ground. Dal follows up the advantage, Logan gets in a kick for a further gain of 15 yards, the ball resting on the Saints' 10-yard line. St. Dunstan's make a light gain of 5 yards by dribbling. Slipp gets a nice pick-up and tries to "get over" but O'Brien proves the barrier and tackles him n-touch.

The Nova Scotians, scenting a score, force matters, the play swinging to the southeast corner of the "grid" on the red and white 7-yard line; McDonald realizing a pass from Langwith. Bates kicks but fails to convert. Score, 1-0.

Within five minutes of the kick-off, Dal again scores, Haslam doing the trick on a Sutherland to Langwith to Haslam combination. Monty plants the pigskin directly behind the goal posts and later converts the touch. Score 11-0.

McCahey again kicks off for Saints. Dal returns for gain in-touch. On the pass the Tigers dribble, Sullivan picks but fumbles, Livingstone grabs ball and uses his 200 pounds for a gain to red and white 10-yard line. The Saints were again awarded a free kick, which is gathered in by Jones, who makes small gain.

The play was confined to centre field at this stage with the Saints' scrum working somewhat better. The latter gain on a dribble into Dal territory but Fraser spoils their chances by going through for a 25-yard run—evidently he was getting cold and thought a little run would warm him up.

With the ball within 15 yards from the S. D. U. line, the black and gold half-line return to work; Haslam and Langwith go for a run across field and pass to Sutherland who dribbles ball over, Haslam doing the scoring on a follow up. Score 14-0.

With five minutes left to play the Saints stage a rally and looked good for a counter on a dribble, the ball going to Dal's 20-yard line; Gavin intercepts a pass here and backs to within 3 yards of scoring, Fraser detaining him long enough for Langwith to get a kick in and relieve the tension. This was the last effort, the Saints had shot their bolt, and when time was called, they were again on the defensive with Dal fighting outside their own territory.

Zev Wants Another Try

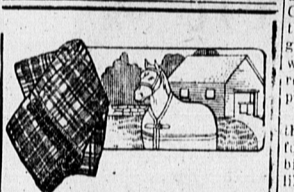

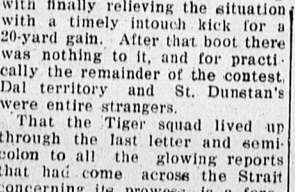

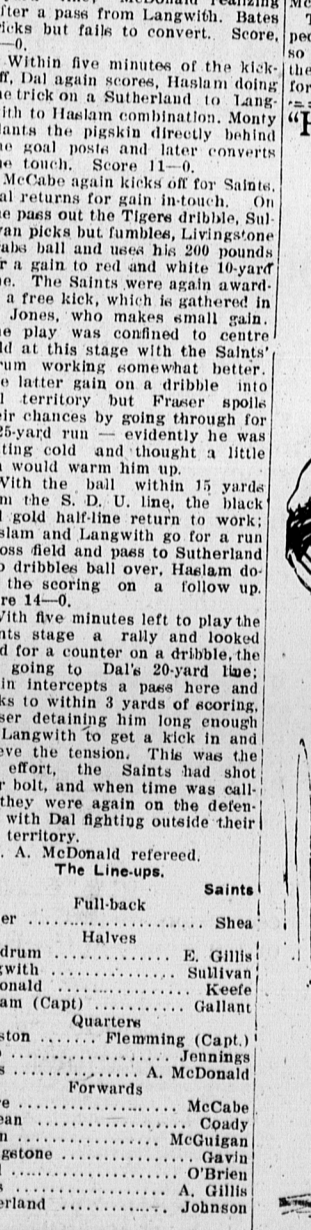
