It was not his first visit to the Island, and he well knew how to appreciate its natural beauties. The people showed their appreciations of the Liberal Government, and gave a generous recognition of the good accomplished for the people of Canada. Their address was all too flattering. A great measure of the Governments successes was due to P. E. Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted check on a Canadian chartered bank for an amount equal to five per cent of the total value of the contract. This check will be forfeited if the party making the tender declines to sign a contract when called upon to do so, or if he fails to satisfactorily complete the service contracted for.
