## Maritimers Qualify In Golf Title Hunt

POINT CLAIRE, Que., Sept. 21.—The Maritime golfing champion, Pretty Babs Creighton of Yarmouth, N. S., flashed the finest form of two weeks today to lead four Easterners through the qualifying round of the Canadian women's open golf championship over Beaconsfield golf club course.

Miss Creighton, who disappointed by failing to qualify in the open last week, bucked a stiff wind and the transposed, par-75 layout to card 45-44-89. She was followed into the first round of match play by Audrey McLeod of Saint John, N. B., and Mrs. W. F. Hutchinson of St. John's Nfld.

But three Maritimers failed and the biggest surprise was capable Maisie Howard of Halifax. Miss Howard, who survived the longest of the Easterners in the open, was far off her true game, carded 47-45-97 and was four strokes back of the last qualifying position.

With her went Mrs. A. Leon Moss of Amherst, N. S., with an 89, Miss D. W. Duncan and Mrs. W. Muir of Halifax, the former shooting 112 and Mrs. Muir 108.

Features of the qualifying play which merges into match play and a final Friday were Mrs. F. J. Mulqueen's medal-winning 80, five over par, and the steady rounds of Mrs. A. B. Darling and Margery Kirkham who carded 81's.

Mrs. Darling, who took the open championship Saturday over Royal Montreal, was slight favorite to continue her triumphs and do what only one woman—Ada MacKenzie of Toronto—has done before, sweep both open and close in the same year.

### IN COLLISION

## Louis Betting Favorite For Fight Tonight

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 21.—(CP)—Another of those fistie experiments is scheduled in the Municipal Stadium here tomorrow night.

In the same arena in which Gene Tunney took the heavyweight crown from Jack Dempsey just 10 years ago this week, blonde Al Ettore of Philadelphia will attempt to do a Max Schmeling and halt the sensational rise of Joe Louis, the Brown Bomber from Detroit. The bout is scheduled for 15 rounds.

The Philadelphia promoters, Taylor and Gunnis, assisted by Mike Jacobs, of New York, look for a crowd of 50,000 and a gate of at least \$200,000.

Most fight men look for another Louis triumph—probably within five rounds and by a knockout—Philly fans hold an entirely different viewpoint. They are sold 100 per cent. on the confident Ettore and their enthusiasm has cut the odds on Louis to 2-1-2 to 1.

Elsewhere, it is a different story. On Broadway, for instance, the betting is 4 or 5 to 1 on the negro.

It is Ettore's big shot. Fighting only five years, he has forged steadily to the front. Three times he beat Leroy Haynes, once figured along with Louis as a dark menace and he also has a decision over James J. Braddock before the latter became heavyweight champion of the world.

He is an unorthodox fighter. Not a dangerous hitter, he swarms all over his opponent, tossing a lot of short but provocative punches and making it extremely difficult for a slugger like Louis to pivot for a knockout punch.

## Ettore Has Idea, But Lacks Equipment To Repel Brown Bomber Is View

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 21.—Al Ettore has the right idea about how to fight Joe Louis, but I fear he lacks the equipment to work at it long enough to upset the calculations of practically everybody outside of Philadelphia in the huge Municipal Stadium here, Sept. 22.

"I'll keep on top of Louis. I'll keep swinging and I won't be afraid," says Ettore. The difficulty is that the home-grown heavyweight lacks the speed necessary to carry on sustained fire against the Negro and the punch that would make such an attack effective.

I repeat that the frequently beaten Ettore is little more than a "club" fighter stepping out of his class to tackle Louis, and that the blond Italian doesn't figure to go more than a half dozen of the 15 scheduled rounds.

But that won't keep the engagement from being a huge financial success. Indications are that Louis and Ettore will square off before 60,000 persons and play to a gate of \$180,000, with the ample seating arrangement scaled from \$2.20 to \$11.50.

Louis was touched by bucks of office magic at the outset, and his knockout by Max Schmeling enables promoters to build the more ordinary opponents such as Ettore into attractions against him in their respective communities.

Ettore is something of a card in his own right in Philadelphia, where he performed as an amateur and broke in as a professional with a protracted winning streak. The roly-poly young signor seldom has been repelled in the Philadelphia district. He sold himself completely with three smashing victories over an over-rated Leroy Haynes. He finally convinced everybody, including Haynes.

The number of experienced Quaker-town observers who profess to believe that Ettore has a chance to repulse Louis is surprising.

### Battlepit Historic

Louis and Ettore square off just one night less than 10 years after Jack Dempsey lost the championship to Gene Tunney in the same battlepit. That one drew the largest turnout in boxing history, 120,757 and the second richest gate \$1,895,733. It also set some kind of a record for cloudbursts, as many of you who made that long tramp down Broad Street will testify.

Rating him off the Schmeling disaster, Ettore calls Louis a dumb fighter. Ettore didn't see that one but then, neither did Louis see much of it. Smoky Joe doesn't consider Umberto, which is what Ettore was christened, an intellectual giant. Two dumb fighters is par it ought to be a pippin while it lasts.

Ettore saw Louis knock out Charley Massera and Lee Ramage in Chicago and Max Baer, Primo Carnera, Paulino Uzcudun and Jack Sharkey in New York. He kept a critical eye glued to the pictures of the Schmeling scrap on several occasions.

Ettore is not being referred to as

"the condemned man." Schmeling stopped that kind of chatter in connection with Louis adversaries for a spell.

Instead, you hear Ettore expressing the opinion that he will outgame Louis.

"I do not believe that Louis is as good as Haynes, and I have beaten Haynes three times," asserts Ettore. "In my opinion, Haynes is a better fighter than I am. He is faster. He hits harder. He has class, but I whipped him three times.

### Convinced Everybody

"I whipped him in 10 rounds. People said it was an accident, so I whipped him in 12 rounds. They still didn't believe it, so I beat him by staying in there and firing away. He got discouraged. He gave up when the going got tough. I figure Louis will do the same thing.

"Louis has looked like a champion against fellows who did not crowd him and who were afraid. To beat me he'll have to look like a champion against a fellow who is jugging the trouble to him. But he won't beat me. I'll win from Louis just like I won from Haynes.

"It's the chance of a lifetime for me. I'm sorry that it did not come sooner. I was offered a match with Louis in Chicago and Detroit last winter, but each time something came up and the match fell through."

Ettore is a trifle short for his 198 pounds. Inside, where he likes to be and where he belts the other bloke's body, the top of his curly head should rest comfortably under Louis' chin, when he can maneuver it into that favorable position.

Low Tendler's lad knows only one way — to wade in with both fists flying. Louis isn't climbing into the ring with an old man like Sharkey or a frightened opponent. Ettore will dig in and dish it out as best he can, but I can't picture a swinger beating Louis, particularly one who couldn't dent Judge Landis' felt hat if permitted a windup.

### GOLFER BREAKS LEG

SWEET GRASS, Mont., Sept. 21.—(AP)—Jacob Frederick's golf swing broke his own leg.

He took such a lusty swipe with his driver that the force of the swing threw him off a low tee at the golf course here. Playing partners carried him to a hospital where doctors said his left leg was fractured.

### Lovelock May Retire After Princeton Meet

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Jack Lovelock, New Zealand's 1,500-metre Olympic Champion, may run his last serious race at Princeton University where he first won International fame.

Arriving in New York today, Lovelock hinted he may hang up his spikes after running in the Princeton Mile Invitational on Oct. 3. It was at Princeton in 1933 that Lovelock shattered the world record for the mile in 4:07.6.

"I am not saying that I'm going to quit," he said. "But I admit that I am getting a bit fed up. Furthermore, I have to devote more of my time to my medical studies."

## Cardinals Regain Second Place Defeating Cubs 5-4

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—(A.P.)—The battling Gas House Gang from St. Louis bounced back into second place in the National League today by licking the Cubs 5-4 at Chicago and at the same time further aiding New York Giants championship cause.

The Cardinal triumph, achieved with the aid of an error by Billy Herman in the ninth inning, left them six full games behind the Giants, with the Cubs another half-game back. The Giants need to win only two of their remaining eight games to finish ahead of the Cards, even if the latter should win their final six. The best the Cubs could do would be a tie if they won their five remaining contests while New York lost eight.

Fred Frankhouse's side-arming baffled the Bees at Boston and stopped them with six hits as Brooklyn Dodgers fired a 14-hit barrage for a 7-1 victory.

The win was Frankhouse's 12th against 10 defeats. Tiny Chaplin, who started for the Bees and was unable to get farther than two out in the first inning before he was shelved from the mound, was charged with his 15th loss of the year. Bobby Reis finished up on the hill for Boston.

## Edwards Shows Class At Saint John Meet

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Sept. 21.—(CP)—The easy stride of Dr. Phil Edwards, Canadian Olympic star, carried him to a record victory in the half mile run at a Maritime open track and field meet here tonight, and the other feature event the ten mile race, was captured by Roy Oliver, New Glasgow, the Maritimers' outstanding long distance runner.

With no apparent exertion Edwards breezed around the half mile in one minute and 57 seconds, or two seconds better than the former Maritime record standing since 1908. His machine-like form completely outclassed the other performers.

By covering 10 miles in the fast time of 54 minutes and 34 seconds, Oliver set the first Maritime record for this distance to be recognized by amateur authorities. He led such stars as Clarence DeMar, of Boston marathon fame, and John Paul, Indian marathoner from Springhill, N.S.
