WHY A CONVENTION?

Some Liberal newspapers are preaching more or less eloquent political sermons on a statement alleged to have been made by the Hon. Robert Rogers, advocating the holding of a national Conservative Convention.

Now, gentle Liberal editor, why should the Conservatives want a convention? From the Atlantic to the Pacific and from the United States boundary to the North Pole, the Conservatives are united as to their policy.

As to leadership there is equal unanimity. Every Conservative in the dominion—and many Liberals, if they would openly acknowledge it—are satisfied that the Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen is the ablest man in the public life of Canada today and that he is quite competent to lead the party and to become the Prime Minister of Canada as soon as the opportunity comes which is now not far distant.

Then, think of the mess the Liberals made of their 1919 convention which has never since been referred to with a capital C. It was hailed at the time as the greatest political Convention ever held.

The only objectors to the present Conservative position are the Liberals. They, for obvious reasons object to the leadership of Mr. Meighen and they preach objections to the Conservative fiscal policy.

It is they that need a convention to decide upon a plan to change the Conservative leadership and to suggest changes in the Conservative fiscal policy both of which discussions will carry as much weight as did their deliberations of 1919.

Notes By The Way

Next to production, the most important interest of the country is transportation. Next to the harvest now being reaped the most interesting thing to the people of Canada is the C. N. R.

It is their railway. Every man and woman in the Dominion is a shareholder in the great company of which Sir Henry Thornton is now the chief responsible head.

So it is but reasonable that the people in all parts of Canada should read the reports issued, from time to time by the railway management with greatest possible interest.

By the latest statement handed out it appears that there has been a betterment in the half-year ending on the 30th of June last to the extent of \$4,172,000.

The fact of the matter is that the C. N. R. has been, and will be, for some time to come, in a state of transition. Its various parts—the Grand Trunk, the Intercolonial, the Transcontinental, the Grand Trunk Pacific, the Great Northern, etc. are in the course of co-ordination.

Meantime the observant traveller by rail will be pleased to note some improvements "all along the line." The trainmen seem to be a little more solicitous for the railway's customers.

According to a return recently issued by the Department of Railways and Canals for the year 1922 there were in that year 456,515 registered automobiles in Canada, of which 2,167 were owned in Prince Edward Island.

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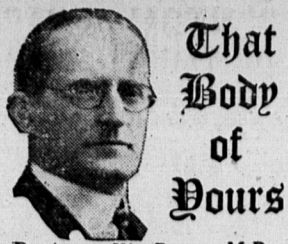

It is amusing when you think about it how everybody talks about the benefit of exercise, and yet what a bugbear it is to so many people.

When a man 74 years of age who has for the past 29 years taken pills for constipation, will tell you that twenty minutes after he takes the simple rocking exercise, he has a natural bowel movement, and has had since the second day he began the exercise, don't you think that those of us who are younger could also get results?

First.—With or without a skipping rope run, jog, or hop in one spot 100 times, alternating right and left leg as in ordinary running, raising the heel fairly well up behind.

Second.—Lie on the back on the floor. Raise both legs, knees straight, almost to right angle with the body. Raise 6 times, increase 1 each week up to 12 times.

Third.—Jog as before.

Fourth.—Rock the body from side to side. Stand with knees straight and back straight, then reach down with right hand to right side as far as you can, curving left hand to armpit.

Fifth.—Jog 50 steps. Increase 5 each week up to 100 steps.
