The steamer could not get within three miles of the Island, and had to send an ice boat to the lighthouse.

The firm at present has a staff of 24 and this is the very dull season. To start a business in this City requires an immense capital but there are splendid openings in any of the new towns. All the people here are charmed with the country and would not return to the old homes under any consideration. The farmers when they come to the city, put up at the best hotels and often stop for a week. Not many of our farmers east can do this. There are good openings for schoolteachers and a I experienced business men but the ordinary clerk is about as well at home. I have met a number of Islanders including Oscar McCallum, now in the Bank of Commerce and A. G. McMillan ex-Vice President of the C. H. College.

THURSDAY, Jan. 15.

William Power was arraigned and pleaded not guilty. He stated he would be ready for trial on Monday. A J. B. Mellish counsel for the prisoner said that Power was a cripple and could not work and was therefore financially unable to pay for the issuing and service of subpoenas required for his defence. The Attorney General agreed to have them issued and served.
