LILIAN NORDICA

FIRST AMERICAN SINGER TO SING LOHENGRIN.

In the little farm of Farmington, Maine, Lillian Norton was born. Later she became known to the world as Madame Lillian Nordica. She studied at the Boston Conservatory of Music, and later in Italy, where her debut at Brescia in "La Traviata" brought her contracts for the Imperial Opera at St. Petersburg and Paris. She was the first American prima donna to sing Wagnerian roles at Bayreuth, the musical shrine of the great composer. She rendered Elsa in "Lohengrin" in 1894. When the accompanist struck the opening chords of Handel's "Angels Ever Bright and Fair," the song that commanded the heart power of singer and composer, the song that is sung again and again to enrapture auditors, it was a signal for the audience to settle down for a rare treat.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
NEW YORK, Nov. 29—Charlie Case, a black face comedian, widely known throughout the United States and Canada, accidentally shot and killed himself at a local hotel today, while examining an automatic revolver. A despatch from Buffalo to the Associated Press tonight says Mrs. Charlotte Case, wife of the comedian, dropped dead in that city this evening just after being apprised of her husband's death.

The Fear of Fear.
(From the New York Times.)

"It was two nights before the first advance, when we were back at— in billets, that I first learned he was afraid, mortally afraid. No one else had ever guessed it, I'm certain, and I never should. But he told me, and there was no mistaking the fact that he was in agony over the telling. It wasn't straining he feared. He wasn't afraid of Boches, or of being killed, but he was mortally terrified of being afraid—afraid of fear, that was his trouble. You might think it a small matter, fancy, and so on. Well, I know what I'm talking about, because I had always kept an eye on the boy, and after this I kept two eyes on him, hard.

Any one else would have been killed fifty times over. He showed no regard whatever for his own safety. He gave himself no chance at all. He courted death and death looked on the other way every time. I don't mean in the least that he committed suicide. Not a bit. What I mean is that he showed more utter and self-forgetful unconcern for his own life than any one I ever saw in my life. At least a dozen times he must have deliberately stepped out into hot fire to pick up and carry in one of his own wounded, and three times, to my knowledge, the wounded man was hit and killed in his arms while he went unchoked.

"You may have heard that our battalion rather distinguished itself. We were in the first advance; and others. Ten minutes before I was knocked out the boy was killed by a bomb. He lived for about three minutes after he was hit, and he died in my arms. I was glad he died, and I think he tasted greater happiness in dying than he'd ever known in living—since the war began, anyhow. He'd lived, without being wounded, through nearly a fortnight of the most hellish fighting ever known. I tell you that fortnight was not less than one long, intolerable crucifixion to him, because of the terror that went everywhere with him and never left him for a second, the ghastly fear of fear, the dread that he was going to be afraid and disgrace himself and the platoon that swore by him. He was smiling like a woman when he died. He said, 'They never guessed, I'm so thankful that—' and then he was gone."

IMPROVEMENT OF THE OLD PASTURES HAS BEEN SOURCE OF STRENGTH TO GERMANY.

A recent bulletin issued by the British Board of Trade is very interesting. It deals with the improved productivity of Germany and makes the following statement:

"That if agriculture had made no more progress in Germany than it has in the United Kingdom during the period 1895-1915, the German Empire would have been at the end of its food resources long before the end of the war."

During the period from 1890 to 1910 the bulletin says:

"The use of basic slag increased three-fold, and as indicative of the enormous consumption of this fertilizer, there is on record the purchase by one single German agricultural society of 620,000 tons in one year. This is about three times the quantity used in the United Kingdom and thirty times the entire consumption in Canada."

Basic slag is largely used in Germany for the improvement of old pastures. Between the years 1883 and 1913 the area brought back from a practically worthless condition to a high state of fertility amounts to 1,237,000 acres. In consequence the production of milk has been doubled.
