Reds And Cards Battle To 8 - all Draw

NEW YORK, May 13 (AP)—Starting late because no umpires had been assigned to the game, the Reds and the Cards battled to a 14-inning 8-8 tie today before darkness cut short a St. Louis hitting attack featuring three home runs by Johnny Mize and one by Joe Judge. The game was at Cincinnati.

Four Cardinal hurlers and five Cincinnati pitchers took part in the 27-hit marathon which, delayed 29 minutes until Umpire Larry Goetz could be called from a day off at home, continued three hours and 35 minutes.

Mize clouted his first homer in the second and a two-run blow in the third off Johnny Vander Meer, on the mound for the first time this year. He hit his third and ninth of the season off reliever hurler Milt Shofner in the 13th, giving his mates a momentary advantage.

The Reds came right back in their half with a pinch-hit double and a single, to tie the game in its final knot.

Young Johnny Hutchings relieved Vandy in the fourth after the double no-hit star fed another circuit smash to Orenego and a single to his opposing moundman, starter Mort Cooper.

At Boston, New York Giants made their hits count, beating the Bees 11-5 for their sixth straight victory and a clean sweep of a three-game series.

Frank Demaree sent the Terrymen away in front with a three-run homer in the first inning and the New Yorkers piled up a nine-run total before Boston could get started.

Harry Gumbert, pitching two-hit scoreless ball for 2-3 innings in relief, was credited with the victory.

Effective relief pitching by Letty Vito Tamulais and a batting exhibition led by Manager Leo Durocher with four hits brought the Dodgers a 6-3 triumph over Philadelphia Phillies at Brooklyn in the deciding contest of their three-game series.

The Dodgers punched out 11 hits off the Pirates and took control of the game in the last of the fifth with three runs on Durocher's double, a walk, Dixie Walker's single and Babe Phelps's triple.

MINISTER SHOWS RELIEFEES "HOW"

AUCKLAND, N. Z., May 13 (CP)—New Zealand's fiery Minister of Public Works, R. Semple, is nothing if not practical. When it was reported that men in a government relief job were doing much less than a fair day's work, he descended on the job armed with a long-handled shovel and a wheelbarrow.

Clad in a singlet, flannel slacks and old shoes, he shifted a quantity of soil reported to have taken two men a full day to move. Although the Minister has had little experience lately between the shafts of a barrow, but for all his 67 years he moved the soil in exactly 10 minutes.

Next day the Minister assembled 57 men on the job and "dressed them in scolding terms. The country could not carry the burden of war if men imposed on the public purse in this way, he declared. He ordered that the cost of the square yard was scandalous and dismissed them on the spot.

Mr. Semple has since volunteered to serve in the army, preferably in a constructional unit, as a private.

B. C. Fishing Craft Patrol Western Coast

VICTORIA, May 12 (CP)—Many raucous little fishing craft which once chugged into Vancouver and Prince Rupert with heavy loads, of halibut have forsaken the fishing banks this year.

The British Columbia coast, taking part in the defence of Canada. They are members of the Fishermen's Reserve, moulded by the Royal Canadian Navy into an efficient defence unit. Their crews are men who used to handle their fishing nets, men who know the West Coast like a book and can work the craft with their eyes shut.

The vessels do not represent the entire British Columbia fleet however, for many others are back once more on the northern banks catching sea food.

Captain taking part in the Fishermen's Reserve are known as "fishermen" and wear the uniform of a petty officer without stripes. The men wear the uniforms of regular ratings. Each division in the reserve is commanded by a regular naval officer.

Recently, a portion of the reserve fleet took part in a review off the mouth of one of its bases. Following the signals of their flagship, the 40 to 50-foot vessels went through manoeuvres and later gave a demonstration of mine-sweeping.

The fishing fleet, carrying depth charges in addition to minesweeping equipment, is suitable particularly for coastal patrol work and assisting the navy in examining cargo vessels entering Canadian waters.

For other purposes, the Canadian Navy has other vessels stationed at its West Coast base. These include warships and several palatial yachts which have been converted for naval uses.

A group of newspapermen had the opportunity of going to sea for a few hours with a warship stationed at the base. Hospitable naval officers conducted them through the ship.

The visitors were allowed to stand only a few feet away when the largest guns of the ship were discharged. So great was the recoil the ship rolled far over on her side. The lens of a photographer's camera was smashed by the concussion and the film of an automatic movie camera was torn.

Later two torpedoes were sent hurtling through the sea, a depth charge was dropped, sending a geyser of white foam high into the air, and a rapid-fire anti-aircraft gun fired several rounds.

HELD FOR INVESTIGATION

Pirates Work Hard But Fail To Win Games

PITTSBURGH, May 13 (AP)—Nothing works for Frankie Frisch and his last-place Pirates.

Frankie Frisch has tried almost everything except hiring a magician to find a winning combination for his National Baseball League club. Of 18 games the Pirates have won five.

Most of the trades have flopped, or nearly so—Lee crowning blow coming in failure of the \$150,000 battery—pitcher John Gee and catcher Ray Mueller. Both are back in the minors now on option.

No Pirate team has worked any harder in spring training than this 1940 entry in the National League race. Since the season started Frisch has gone the limit in experimenting. In one game he used 24 men—a league record.

Frisch admits it seems useless to lose sleep over his current aggression. "No purpose can be served in criticism of these players," he said today. "I am convinced some of them cannot deliver but nobody can say they are not hustling."

Syracuse Chiefs Down Royals 3-2

MONTREAL, May 13 (CP)—Syracuse Chiefs vaulted over Montreal Royals into sixth place in the International League baseball standings today as they downed Montreal Royals 3-2 behind the seven-hit pitching of Ted Kleinshank.

Kleinshank allowed a run on Bert Haas third homer of the season in the fourth inning and another in the eighth on a pair of singles and an infield out.

Lazy Walters paced a nine-hit Syracuse attack on two Montreal pitchers with two doubles and two singles for a perfect day.

Ken Trinkle walked Eric Tipton in the last of the ninth, with the bases loaded and two out, to force home the winning run as the Maple Leafs ended a five-game losing streak with a 5-4 victory over Baltimore Orioles at Toronto.

The Leafs ahead from the third inning took a 4-1 lead into the ninth but it disappeared on Bill Nagel's homer with two on base.

Bill Southworth pinch-singed with one out in the last of the ninth and was forced by Bates. Chapman singled and Boss was purposefully passed to load the bases.

Frankie couldn't regain control and walked Tipton on five pitches, to force in Bates with the deciding run. Jersey City continued its winning ways up downing the Red Wings 8-4 at Rochester. The victory enabled the little Giants to gain a full game on the Wings and Baltimore Orioles.

Although thumped for 12 hits, rookie Harry Fedman went right to work in scoring his third win for the Jersey. The little Giant led by Tom Neill who clouted a home run, double and two singles, racked up 12 hits off three Rochester southpaws.
