

Hillside Scott Wins Trotting Crown

Dartmouth Driving Club Horses Win Both Titles As 2-Day Meeting Ends

Racing to a straight heat victory over Victor Lee, Fred Lahey's Hillside Scott yesterday gave the Dartmouth Driving Club their second championship in as many days when he trotted off with the trotting title, adding it to the crown captured by Scott Weeks' pacer on Wednesday.
