Q. Are industrial users of sugar and public caterers rationed? A. Yes, industrial users, caterers, operators of institutions such as schools and hospitals, must register with the Board...

No, Husbands and ornaments of social and charity functions must provide sugar from their own rations or request their guests to bring their own unless such functions are sponsored by the Red Cross and provided with sugar supplies by the Red Cross...

DEAR MISS DIX—I have been married nine years, have a handsome son, 3 years old, a grand husband and home. My husband declares he loves me more than anything in the world, but he says he is too sure of me. He tells me I could not cheat if I wanted to and he wants me to go out with other men just for company and companionship to see whether I could make him jealous...

I am young and good-looking, but it is against my principles to be unfaithful to my husband and I don't want to do it. I can't eat or sleep as I love my husband and son, and the thought of all this has about made me crazy. What shall I do?

ANSWER—Your husband is either daffy or else he is trying to trick you into doing something that will give him grounds for divorcing you. No man in his senses, who really loved his wife and wanted to keep his home together, would urge her to have affairs with other men.

No matter how much of a philanderer a man may be, no matter how many sordid love affairs he may engage in, no matter how much he may urge other women to take their pleasure as they find it and to snap their fingers in Mrs. Grundy's face, he wants his wife to keep her skirts spotless and be like Caesar's wife—above reproach.

Nor does any man want a wife who makes him jealous. In the days of courtship a girl may have picked his interest by flirting with other men, but when he is married to her that phase of their relationship is all over. Then he wants a woman whom he can trust, of whom he is sure and who will not keep him worried and harried by doubts and fears and suspicions.

THE COOK'S CORNER

EGG AND POTATO CASSEROLE

Four tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 4 cups cooked potatoes, cubed; 6 hard-cooked eggs, sliced, salt, pepper and paprika. Melt butter. Blend in flour. Add milk gradually and stir until sauce thickens. Season to taste. Put alternate layers of potatoes, eggs and sauce in buttered baking dish. Sprinkle top with buttered cracker crumbs or grated cheese. Bake in hot oven about 15 minutes. Serves six to eight.

FISH ROLL

Two cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons shortening, 2-3 cup milk (about). Mix and sift dry ingredients. Cut in shortening, add milk to make a soft dough. Roll dough 1/4 inch thick and spread with the following mixture: One and a half cups cooked flaked fish, 1 small onion, chopped; 2 tablespoons green pepper, chopped; 1-2 teaspoon salt. Dash of pepper, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, enough milk to moisten slightly.

Roll like a jelly roll. Cut in 1-1/2 inch slices and bake at 400 degrees F. for about 30 minutes. Serve with a tomato sauce.
