Ont. Liquor Law Will be Modeled On Alberta Act

(Special to the Guardian)
TORONTO, Mar. 2.—Predictions in Tory circles are that the government control bill will more closely follow that of Alberta than of any other of the government control provinces. It will be almost the beer and club license features of the province named. Hotel keepers, it is now definitely stated, will have to wait awhile for the privilege of serving beer at meals. This, it is emphatically asserted is only a temporary deprivation, the ultimate aim is provision for the service. Otherwise it is felt that the tremendous prospective increase in tourist traffic will not materialize and also that Ontario will drink too much hard liquor and too little beer.

Those who profess to have some knowledge of the situation reiterate that in respect to many of its important phrases, the "strong man" commission will have very wide powers in operating of the liquor act. For instance as to the sale by government dispensaries. While the act may be fixed, in a tentative way by the bill, the commission will have discretionary authority to allow vendors' shops in cities and industrial centres to sell until a late hour at night. The idea of this proposition is said to be necessity of fighting the bootlegger.

MONTREAL, Mar. 2.—With but 19 cattle, 2 sheep, 200 hogs and 55 calves for sale on the two markets this morning, prices were unchanged. Hogs sold mostly at \$12.00, about one half were purchased on a graded basis with \$2.00 per hog premium on selects and 50 cents out on shops and heavies and the balance were bought at \$12.00. Good veals were in demand and one lot of choice calves at \$12.50. Fairly good calves brought \$11.00 and \$11.25 and common kinds were slow at \$10.00. Practically all the cattle were common cows and canners.

Federal Govt. to Impose Tax on Furs

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, March 2.—For the first time in 250 years a tax is to be placed upon furs from the northwest territories. Within a few days Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, will introduce a bill into the House of Commons to empower the commissioner-in-charge of the northwest territories to impose a tax per pound on furs.

At the present time about \$2,000,000 worth of furs are taken from the territories each year by trading companies without revenue to the federal government. The proposed tax is designed to meet to some extent the cost of maintaining the administration of Canada's northern land.

It is pointed out that every pound of Canada has some part of tax on furs taken within its boundaries. The tax is used upon exportations in order not to work any hardships upon the natives who depend upon skins for the clothing.
