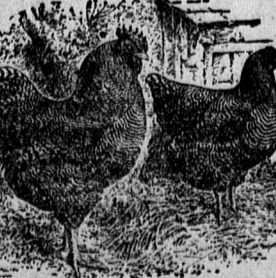

 puts new burthens on the consumer. Another faithful friend, the "New Statesman," tells Mr. Lloyd George this week that he certainly deserves to lose a General Election over his "National Insurance Fiasco." The plaintive Mr. Outhwaite, not content with declaring at the beginning of Cobden's campaign that the vote was at the bottom of it, wails that the new land policy is not worth fighting for. Mr. Lloyd George is an electioneering genius, for that very reason he is about the last man to whom the reconstruction of English agricultural interests should be committed.
 And, above all, if the appeal to class-hatred was suspended at the Union—why? Because Oxford does not believe in it or because Mr. Lloyd George does not believe in it himself? Either way it is an interesting dilemma, whether the omission of the provocative appendix was due to a merely tactical restraint or to a natural absence of the heat artificially generated for platform purposes elsewhere. We would like to think that the latter theory is true, and that the Chancellor, in spite of the daily denunciations of the Radical Press about the enormous electioneering advantages to be expected and sought from the catch-vote campaign, is really in favour of a non-party treatment of the subject. He tells this to the under-graduates; they would rather be told it to the Marines. His words are often pleasant. Yet his appeals for Unionist co-operation at the beginning of the Insurance Act soon led somehow to rushing tactics representing the grossest abuse of mere party power. In the same way, despite incidental soft phrases, what is the real tendency of his present attitude on Ulster? There is grave doubt on that point. Public opinion, preplexed by the two voices, will judge him by his acts. It is less interested in knowing what is the Unionist land policy than in knowing which is the real Mr. George.

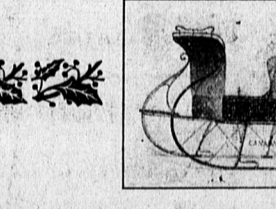
Mr. James Gallant, of the Steward's department of the C. G. S. Minto, spent the week-end in Charlottetown and returned to Summerside yesterday afternoon.
