Through some mishap, the crank slipped from his hand while letting down the draw and owing to the weight of it suddenly revolved, hitting him a severe blow on the head, near the right eye and also injuring his arm and back. He was taken to Mr. Chas. Moore's where medical aid was summoned. He remained unconscious about four hours and it was feared he might not recover. In time he began to rally and later when he was able to travel, was conveyed by auto to his home on the West River, where he is resting comfortably. If the blow on the head had been just slightly higher it would have killed him. As it was he was badly injured and has had a very narrow escape from death.

Mrs. John MacNevin of West River is recovering from a serious illness and her many friends hope soon to see her around as usual. James MacQuarrie of Riverdale who sold his farm recently to Norman MacLeod has gone with his bride to Boston where he will locate. It is certainly a great loss to our Province to thus lose our young people.

An aged resident of Tryon living alone, performed an annual stunt one night last week. What was the compelling motive may be cannot be definitely known, but this somnambulist in the quietness of the midnight rose from his slumbers and being dressed only with under garments and night attire walked to Crapaud with no footwear, but his socks. He was found about five a.m., wandering about near Storey's Mills, taken in to a house clothed, fed and driven back to his home. The unfortunate man did not know where he was going. The scars on his countenance showed that he had travelled through wood and brush as he was slightly scratched.

Twelve Tons Of Eels Are Being Held

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 13.—An industry not much spoken of, but one that is rapidly gaining attention, is the eel fisheries of the Mersey River. Experienced fish buyers say that the quality and size of eel taken in this river cannot be duplicated anywhere. In the crates above Milton about twelve tons of these fish are being held until the market price is attractive enough to sell. The average weight would be about two pounds each, some of them weighing five or six pounds, and one eel was caught in that vicinity weighing ten pounds and eleven ounces. A peculiarity not common to most fish is the fact that these eels begin to be caught about August, when they are put in floating pens without food, sea water, and after being in these pens for three or four months they usually increase in weight.
