PAMPHLET ON POULTRY.—The above is the title of a valuable little book that has just been prepared and published by Mr. F. J. Holman, of the Charlottetown firm of that name. It is addressed to farmers, farmers' wives, sons and daughters. The objects of the pamphlet are well outlined in a foreword in which Mr. Holman writes: "As many of you are well aware, I have been dealing in poultry for several years, and have naturally gained some knowledge of the trade, and I now wish to place



before all poultry raisers, some of the difficulties which must be overcome in order to bring the poultry industry to a higher standard, and the greatly benefit all concerned—the producer, the dealer and the consumer." Mr. Holman deals with what is wanted for the poultry market, the kind of birds to raise, and then gives valuable suggestions on how to feed and fatten them and dress them for market, as well as how to prepare them for shipment. For the production of prime dressed poultry, the general purpose American breeds, such as the Plymouth Rocks, Wyandottes and Rhode Island Reds, as well as the Orpingtons are, he says, excellent. A few timely "don'ts" and some equally useful notes complete a book that should be of great value to poultry raisers. A post card to Mr. Holman at any time will bring in return a copy of the pamphlet on poultry.

Dr. Wm. Keir and Mrs. Keir, Malpeque, P. E. I.
Dear Friends:—We have Scriptural authority for the observance of years of Jubilee. In the good providence of God, you honored Dr. and Mrs. Keir, have been spared to complete the full fifty years of married life. We trust, therefore, that you will pardon some of your friends, not all—for your friends are legion and far separated—if they intrude themselves upon you for a short time on this glad anniversary. Our purpose is to rejoice with you, and if possible to add a little to your joy. In one of his poems, "Lucile," Lord Lytton speaks of that dominion which the life of one man, if his life be a truth, may exert over the lives of mankind. Your life has been associated with a profession which you have honored and adorned for many years. In that profession, one of the highest that can be exercised on earth, your conduct has been truth of transparent quality. You have always stood for the best elements in a high calling and thus, you have entered into a great dominion,—that of the sincere regard of your fellows because of unselfish service. In the regard of others you have been giving unto measure you have been measured to you again. You did not sow sparingly of unselfish labor and now in the personal esteem and truly respectful love of a very wide circle you are reaping a harvest in the eventide of life that might well be envied by any member of any profession. You are rich, sir, in the regard of not only the immediate neighborhood, where your labors have been mostly exercised, but of this entire sea-girt Province,—rich in the true respect of your co-laborers of the medical fraternity,—and may we not venture to add that as your life in the past has garnered these elements of richness, so will your future be bright as the promises of God. We sincerely congratulate you therefore on your long period of service in the ministry of healing. But more,—we must also mention the arduous nature of your labors. Many records have been left which indicate that the life of a country practitioner is no sinecure. Could we gain access to your diary, (if you kept one) or could we read that indelible diary that has been written in your experience we would find the record that through many years, in all weathers, by day and night, you have been ready to respond to the call of sickness. All classes have found in you a sincere friend and loving helper for their bodily need, until, in these latter days, the sight of your white locks but unbent form is regarded as a real benediction in the homes where pain and sorrow dwell. It is our joy to declare that there the Doctor appears at his best, for your long experience and accurate knowledge inspire great confidence, and your cheery personality has a splendidly tonic effect upon any spirit that may be depressed. Pardon us for speaking thus plainly in your presence. It is the very truth that we utter, and for once at least we are determined to say some of the things that we honestly believe. Appreciation delayed until too late for the earthly presence is surely a poor tribute and scarcely worth offering. Nor shall we transgress the limits in your profession. What more gladdening to any doctor's heart than the sight of restored health; and of the large number who, in the outworking of the Divine plan, owe their lives to his efforts. We congratulate you on your eminent success which labors in this profession. Your patients rise up and call you

blessed,—some of them testifying that they would not be alive today to join in these congratulations but for "the Doctor."
Nor would we forget that while going out before the public as the healer of men, you have had the splendid support of Mrs. Keir. For these 50 years she has ably seconded your labors for the general good, and has, when occasion required and circumstances permitted, gone out to homes to nurse through the trying hours of weary pain. She has at the church, and community, thereby filling a place equally honorable and necessary as that of her distinguished husband, and making it easy for him to go out under all conditions to heal and to soothe the sick world that leaned on him.
In those years of Jubilee, of which we read in Sacred Writ, the command to God's ancient people was that they should neither sow nor reap that which grew of itself. But we trust that now, having entered upon the 51st year, and therefore being absolved from the requirements of that command you will not be unwilling to reap a little something that has grown of itself. That which we have great pleasure in presenting to you as a slight token of deep respect, sincere esteem, and hearty good wishes, has truly grown of itself,—a little leaven of the Doctor's love for many coming back to him again, and we ask you to accept it (here present the purse) not for its intrinsic value, but because many could not be denied the privilege of tendering some token of their regard to Dr. and Mrs. Keir on this anniversary occasion.
Heartily congratulating you both on a long and useful life, we wish you all joy and blessing for the days to come.
