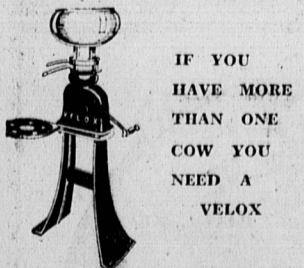

CANADA'S HYDRO ELECTRIC POWER SYSTEMS

Q.—What place does Canada hold in the power world?

A.—Canada now holds a leading place in the power world. Fifteen great power systems, public and private, control 82 per cent of the total output. The total output for 1926—excluding duplications—due to purchased power—was nearly 10,000 million kilowatt-hours, the total installed plant was over 3,300,000 horse power of which over 96 per cent was water power. Canada is maintaining a leading position in this department of modern development.

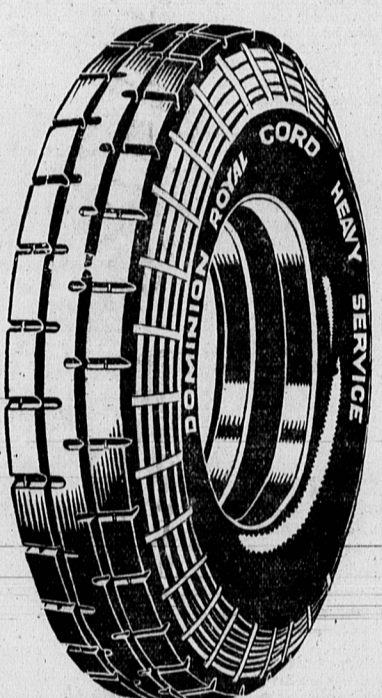

MORE DISMISSALS WILL NOW BE MADE

OTTAWA, Ont., May 15. — The committee on privileges and elections got down to business on the consideration of the reports of Mr. Justice A. H. Clarke on the Athabasca election of 1925. Meetings of the committee have been deferred pending the printing of an adequate supply of copies of the reports.

The Hon. E. Lapointe informed the committee that through some mistake the attorney-general of Alberta had only forwarded that part of the evidence relating to the interim report of Mr. Justice Clarke. The rest of the evidence had been requested and is expected to be in Ottawa shortly.

He then read to the committee a letter from D. F. Kellner, M.P., submitting five names of persons who in his opinion should be forthwith dismissed from the public service. Three of these had already been dismissed and the others will be similarly dealt with.

"Anyone who has been found guilty of election crime cannot remain in the service," stated Hon. J. C. Elliott. Adjournment was made to Thursday, next week.

The Hon. E. Lapointe assured W. G. McQuarrie and members of the committee that there would be no morning sittings of the House of Commons for some time yet. "There are too many committees sitting for us to do that yet," he said. This is another indication that the session will last three or four weeks yet.
