THE S. S. Stanley arrived at Georgetown yesterday forenoon at ten o'clock, bringing two cars four, five I. C. R. cars of way freight, one horse, thirty passengers and the mails. Among the passengers were George Hyndman, son of Mr. F. W. Hyndman, and Corney Blanchard, son of Judge Blanchard, both on their way home to spend the holidays.

YESTERDAY at the Police Court the Prohibition case of Wm. McCallum was adjourned till Thursday, and the case of Henry McEwen was also adjourned. It was charged that this offender had sold liquor in G. A. Essoy's stable, but the defendant's lawyer claimed that the evidence was false. The case of A. W. Reddin was not proceeded with, a new information being asked for.

THERE was a large attendance at the Liberal Convention held yesterday in this city to nominate a Federal candidate for Queen's County as a colleague to A. B. Warburton. L. E. Prowse was proposed by Dr. Frank Martin of Eldon, and seconded by D. J. Riley, Charlottetown. Horace Haszard was proposed by Charles W. Kelly of Stanley, and seconded by James A. McMillan of Wood Islands. The result of the ballots, was Prowse, 107; Haszard, 102. Mr. Haszard moved, seconded by Isaac Essoy that the nomination be made unanimous.

THE postponed concert of the McDonald Consolidated School at 1131-borough which took place on Thursday night was a most enjoyable affair, and there was a good attendance, the receipts amounting to \$30. During the evening an address was given by Principal Jones, who read the following message from Dr. James W. Robertson, Knowlton, Quebec: "Sir William McDonald and I send warmest greetings and good wishes for continued success of school, happiness, usefulness and prosperity of teacher-pupils and people of locality and Island."

The next session will be held Jan. 9th '07, when likely the debate on the address will be concluded.

It has been decided to apply the unexpended balance remaining over from the Christmas Dinner and Tree fund for the purchase of coal to be given to needy persons. After the Christmas Tree entertainment was ended on Thursday last all the good things remaining were made up into parcels and divided between the Hospitals and the Asylum, and bags of good things were sent to each of the inmates of the Poorhouse. There were also sent some useful articles to the Almshouse. The dishes used at the entertainment were kindly furnished free of charge by A. N. McKee. There is to be a business meeting of the Ladies, who were engaged in connection with the project at 3.30 this afternoon in the City Council Chamber.

THE semi-annual examination of the Union Road, Lot 33, school, took place in the afternoon of Thursday, the 27th Dec. The attendance of parents and others interested was very large, nearly every person in the district was present. The different classes were put through a searching examination by the teacher Miss Dawson and Miss Marion Henderson, who was home from Prince of Wales College. The pupils in the several classes acquitted themselves very creditably. A very marked improvement is evident in the matter of order and discipline under Miss Dawson's thorough management. Such a marked and cheering advance has been made as to justify the desire of parents and those interested in the school that she may continue in Union Road, Lot 33, school.
