

OVER A HUNDRED KILLED IN A MINING DISASTER

Forty Bodies Recovered and Fifty to One Hundred Still Entombed

(Canadian Press.) BOCHUM, Aug. 8.—A mining disaster which imperilled the lives of 650 pitmen occurred in Lorraine pit in the vicinity of the Village of Gerthe today.

Many of the men were rescued but at a late hour this evening it was feared that over a hundred men were killed.

At six o'clock bodies were recovered and rescue parties were unable to enter the gallery in which a damp explosion occurred where it was believed from 50 to 100 men are still entombed and had almost certainly perished.

A large number of those rescued are suffering from severe injuries and it was expected that many of them would not recover.
