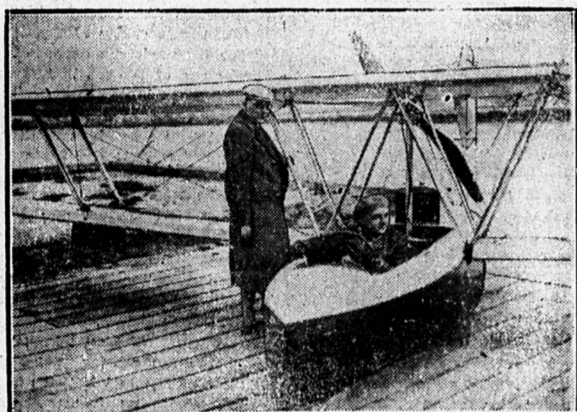
### Honored

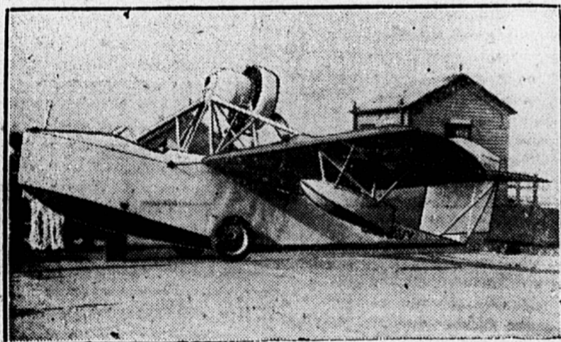
Donna May, age 3, and Norman John Radunsky, 4, of Waterloo, Ont., are separated by immigration regulations from their father, who has been detained at Detroit for five months. He got into his personal predicament through going back to Milwaukee to discharge personal debts. Being of German birth and having become naturalized as a United States citizen, he cannot now return to his family in Ontario, having failed to satisfy requirements of Canadian immigration authorities. Radunsky discharged his obligations in Milwaukee and was on the point of entering Canada when he was stopped. The fact that he had two children and a comfortable and independent living awaiting him made no difference. The law said he could not enter. The American authorities, learning that in the mental stress caused by his wife's death he had forgotten to renew his papers, declared that country out of bounds for him. So in the strict interpretation of the law, he is a "man without a country."

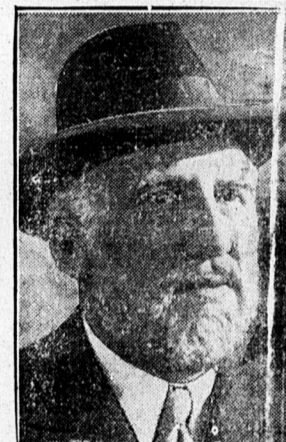

## New Pyjamas



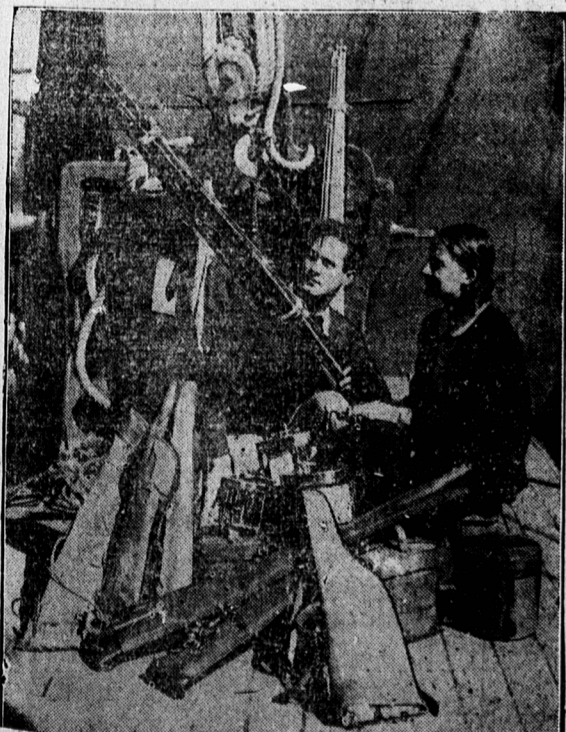

## Noted Lawyer



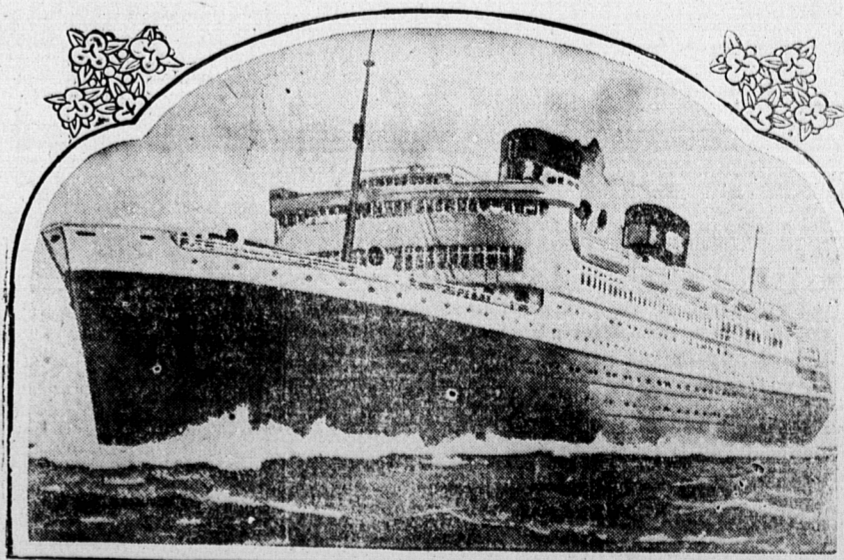
