LOBSTER FACTORY AT CAPE TRAVERSE WAS DESTROYED

(Special to The Guardian) CAPE TRAVERSE, July 5.—The lobster factory of W. E. Howatt, Cape Traverse, together with gasolene and bait house was burned to the ground at two o'clock this morning.

Mr. Howatt's loss will be easily \$2,000. Some cases of lobsters were burned, probably twenty. The wind was light and favourable to the village, otherwise Cape Traverse would have been wiped out.

DUQUOIN, Ill., July 2.—Charles Matthis, chief engineer at the Paradise coal mine, near here, today saved four hundred miners from burning to death.

For half an hour, while flames raged in the coal chutes a few feet away, Mr. Matthis stood at his post, waving the hoist which brought the men out of the 400-foot shaft, to which every moment the fire threatened to spread.

SIR IAN HAMILTON VISITS THE WEST

(Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, July 4.—Sir Ian Hamilton, Inspector General of the Imperial forces and Col. the Hon. Sam. Hughes, Minister of Militia returned to Ottawa to-night from their trip to the West.

He made, however, some interesting remarks on the Western country. "It is essentially a place for old soldiers and young women," he said, "I am amazed at the growth and progress everywhere. I believe the red coat is binding the east and west as much together as even the prodigious efforts of the Grand Trunk, the Canadian Pacific and the Canadian Northern."

Sir Ian praised highly the spirit of the Canadian soldier and commented on the action of the Minister of Militia in acquiring new large areas for training and manoeuvring purposes.

NEW CABLE LAID AT THE CAPES

The Guardian was, yesterday, shown a section of the new cable just laid between Capes Traverse and Tormentine, by the Anglo American Telegraph Company.

The cable is 2 1/2 inches in diameter. The conductor, a copper wire 3/4 inch in diameter, forms the central core and is encased in a bed of gutta percha. An inch in diameter. This is reinforced by a double row of steel armour wound around spirally and this again covered by a layer of prepared hemp, all waterproof and apparently indestructible. It weighs 16 tons to the mile. Its size, make up, and the material of which it is composed give the impression that it was built to endure for ages.

It was not the intention to lay the new cable before next autumn but owing to the work on the car ferry piers the government had requested the company to move the cable to avoid possible accident.

Mr. A. E. Morrison, Manager of the Anglo-American Telegraph Company in Charlottetown, was at the Capes since Tuesday in connection with the work and returned to the city Thursday evening. The company is to be congratulated on the promptness with which it has grappled with this somewhat complicated cable problem and the general improvement already made and still in progress in connection with the service.
