QUEEN'S COUNTY GUARDIAN

Head Offices in New Prowse Block—Charlottetown

CARVELL Bros. will receive by train this Sunday from Georgetown ex-Stanley 60 cases oranges, lemons and onions.

THE paths surrounding the public buildings in Queen Square were shoveled off with commendable promptness yesterday.

FIFTY passengers arrived by the S. S. Stanley at Georgetown yesterday including Charles Fitzgibbon of Charlottetown, coming home on a visit from Moncton.

Born the winter steamers took full cargoes of freight to and from the Island yesterday. With the probability of uninterrupted trips hereafter it will not be long before all the freight on each side is transported.

A SHORT session of the Local Legislature was held yesterday morning. The Bill to incorporate the Lords Company, of Albany, was advanced a stage in Committee, and some questions were asked and answered regarding Cardigan Ferry and certain roads in Kings County.

At 1 p. m. the House adjourned until 3 p. m., Monday next.

THE case of McGee and another vs. Campbell, an action of interpleader, was tried summarily at Supreme Court Chambers, Thursday, before Mr. Justice Hodgson. David J. Thompson being claimant of the goods seized. The claims were allowed on costs and the sheriff was ordered to withdraw. Ha zard, K. C. and Gaudet for judgment creditors; McQuarrie for claimant.

BLAKE Bros., of this City, weighed yesterday at the Market scales, in the presence of a number of interested spectators, six handsome shorthorn steers, fed by themselves. These cattle have been fed two years, and were pronounced by all to be one of the best, if not the best lot ever seen together in the City. The lot comprised one steer raised by W. Buntain, Rustico, weight 1700; one by James Sharp, Margate, 1675; one by John McNeil, C. Vendish 1650; one by J. Davis Schurman, 1655; one by James McMurdo, 1680; another by James McMurdo, 1531. The cattle are intended for the Easter trade and will undoubtedly dress out splendid beef.

SERGEANT MAJOR WALLACE McKEE, of the Army Medical Corps, has returned from the Military Hospital, Halifax, where he has been qualifying himself for the rank in the corps which he at present holds. Three other Charlottetown boys Sergeants Wm. Cornfoot, Harry Nelson, and Preston McLean, have at the Hospital taking the medical course. Reg. Ryan, another Charlottetown, and a son of the late Conductor Ryan is now a Marine Gun instructor in the Halifax garrison, as well as signal instructor. He holds the rank of Color Sergeant. He is doing well and also a number of other representatives from this Province, who are all popular members of the military force at present garrisoning Canada's Atlantic citadel.

THE will of the late Frank Elen, of Halifax, was filed in that city a few days ago. The estate is valued at about \$10,000. Testator devises all his personal property, including household furniture to his widow Mary during her lifetime, or as long as she may remain a widow; \$300 to the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and other legacies. His son Frederick F. and daughter Helen are to receive support and maintenance from their mother as long as she continues to live with her. His property is divided between his son Frederick F. and his three daughters—Helen C.; Evelyn (Mrs. Scott); and Mary Ethel (Mrs. Charles Gavia, Duffy) Charlottetown. The latter is bequeathed properties Nos. 50 and 103 Maynard St. 429 Gorington St. and No. 1 Prince William St. for life; should she die leaving issue the property to go to such issue, share and share alike. Should she die without issue the properties revert to the estate to be divided among testator's surviving children. This devise is in addition to property No. 285 Gtington St., bequeathed to her during her lifetime.

REV. W. R. MOTLEY, pastor of the Christian Church at Montague, who crossed by the Cape on the 5th inst., arrived at Newport News on the 9th. Writing to the Guardian he says that while the crossing was long and arduous still the smiling faces and the good cheer of the lady passengers made the burden light, and the trip enjoyable. Mr. Motley was the most popular man in Newport News on the day of his arrival being interviewed by the entire staff of new reporters of that city. He had sent a telegram from Montague on the 4th, that the steamers were stuck in the ice and having wired his eventual crossing and safe arrival on the mainland, his reception when he reached Newport News was almost equal to Peary's on his recent return from the Arctic regions. Owing to the incompleteness of the new First Christian Church services were held the first Sunday in the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium. Mr. Motley preached to large congregations. On the Thursday following, he, with a large delegation from his church, visited the Jamestown Exposition to lay a corner stone of the Exposition Building of the Christian Church of Virginia, which will cost \$10,000. 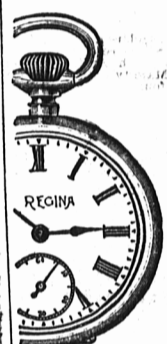
