The Court was addressed by Mr. Donald McKinnon and Mr. W. B. Bentley, K. C. Judgment was reserved and the Court adjourned sine die.

The Property Committee reported that the new room in Queen's Square School and the Board Office, which is being repaired, will be ready for occupation about the first of December. Acting on the first of December, the meeting in the Board Office, the meeting on Monday night was held in the Legislative Assembly Chamber, Principal Seaman reported on the work of Prince St. in connection with Trafalgar Day celebration and stated that the school proposes planting bulbs and selling the flowers in aid of the Red Cross Fund. The other principals brought matters of interest to the notice of the meeting.
