The scene of the play is laid in a small Jersey town near New York City. It is ultra modern in character replete with lightning changes of mind, snappy and humorous retorts, enough profanity to class it with "big time" stage productions of "legitimate". Miss Bishop played the role of Kate Bence, who had the illusion that she possessed an artistic temperament, in a most realistic manner. She literally "lived the part". Great credit is due this coterie of young thespians for their fine presentation of this high-powered and complex comedy drama.—K.
