SUMMARY

Taxation Act making special arrangements for the taxation of land. Virtually the changes now proposed to be made here are in accordance with those made in British Columbia. They involve a considerable saving of money for land taxpayers shall be issued every year at a cost of hundreds of dollars.

It is also proposed that the taxpayer shall be given an opportunity to be heard in case the collector shall report default in payment. Proceeding against the taxpayer alleged to be in default are to be taken by the Provincial Treasurer—not by the local tax collector—and in case the deed issued for the sale of the land shall be issued not by the tax collector, but by the Provincial Treasurer.

The resolution was referred to a committee of the whole House, Mr. McDonald in the chair, and reported agreed to.

On motion of Hon. Mr. McDonald, the House then went into committee on the Road Act, 1924. Several clauses held over were reconsidered. There was a division in committee on the question whether the salary of the Road Master should be \$12 or \$15, the latter sum being preferred by the majority. It was provided that arrears of road money may be collected by the road master by bringing a suit before the County Court, as for an ordinary debt.

Hon. Mr. McDonald moved that an addition to the Act should be made prohibiting the posting of bills and advertisements on the borders of the roads except by consent of the Commissioner of Public Works. The proposed amendment was opposed by Mr. Dennis, the leader of the Opposition. Mr. J. A. McDonald, Hon. Dr. McMillan, Mr. Buntain, Mr. Hunter, and others. Hon. Mr. McDonald said that the proposed prohibition was asked for the good Roads Association. The object to keep in line with the rest of Canada and to enable auto-drivers to pass through the country without being confused by signs of various kinds. The proposed amendment was lost. Mr. Saunders suggested that notices should be placed at the ends of lines of bushes on the ice, to show the traveller where they led to.

Hon. Mr. McDonald said that the suggestion was a good one, but it could be carried out by Departmental Regulation. Legislation is unnecessary.

Hon. Mr. Stewart submitted a bill intitled "The Land Assessment Act 1924." The bill was read a first time. Then, on motion of Hon. Mr. Arsenault, the bill to make uniform the law respecting Life Insurance was read a second time and committed. Mr. Buntain in the chair, Hon. Mr. Arsenault explained that the bill covers all the laws respecting life insurance now in force here, and also makes our laws uniform with those of the other Provinces. The bill, he said had been prepared by the commission for the uniformity of laws in Canada. Progress was reported at one o'clock and the House took recess.

Public Works Report

In the course of the sitting Hon. Mr. McDonald presented the annual report of the Department of Public Works. This report shows that projects covering 579 miles of country roads and 3.4 miles of roads through incorporated municipalities. Of these the total expenditures to date have been:

By the Provincial Government	\$ 220,189.81
By Charlottetown	86,542.65
By Summerside	4,400.73
Total	\$ 311,133.19

Of this amount the Dominion Government is liable for \$391,078.41 and has already paid \$374,115.11, of which Charlottetown has received \$344,617.06. There remains at Ottawa available for highways, \$329,339.89 of which there is now due to the Provincial Government \$16,963.30,—leaving still to be earned \$212,376.59. Of this amount the towns are estimated to require \$35,664.69 and there remain to the Provincial Government \$176,711.90. To take up this amount it will be necessary for the Province to raise \$265,067.85,—making a total expenditure of \$540,744.74 for the next two years of \$441,779.75. The Provincial Engineer, Mr.

Shaw, remarks that, "this sum should go far towards, if not wholly complete, the program originally laid out, as the price of material and labor is much lower now than in 1920 and 1921.

Referring to the smaller bridges and culverts Mr. Shaw remarks that "though upwards of 400 wooden bridges have been replaced by iron culverts and 450 larger ones by reinforced concrete, there are still approximately 4,000 wooden structures to be renewed or maintained; and as much of the material locally available is of a very indifferent quality and short-lived, it would seem advisable to extend still further the use of more permanent material in the construction of all our bridges."

A large number of bridges that were washed away or partially destroyed by the great storm of the first of October have been made passable. Some of these will, it is stated, have to be made more permanent. The slip and floats at Rocky Point were also badly wrecked and the approach to Lower Montague wharf was almost completely washed out. The ferry wharves and slips at Ellis River suffered severely. At Lower Montague a large expenditure will be necessary in the wings and approach to continue the wharf service. A new boat for Ellis River Ferry will, the Provincial Engineer states, have to be provided.

And then watch the crowd melt away if for any reason the motion of the sign stops. Drama is action and action interests all living things from the very lowest life in the bed of the ocean to the most highly developed intellect possessed by man. It is said by philosophers that we have been all wrong in the past belief that self preservation is the first law of nature. We are now told that the expenditure of energy is the first law of every living organism.

If this is true, how much more true it must be that we are all more interested in action of every sort than in any other one thing. Fifty thousand people gather to see a football game or a baseball game of the world's series. Not all the money in Wall Street could get together a crowd like that to watch a chess game. So, try to make your advertising a world's series event—a struggle on the grid iron—rather than a calm philosophic discussion of those things with which it is concerned.
