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POLICE ARE AFTER THE MURDERER

Of Miss McAulay - Man Already Under Arrest Thought to be Culprit.

St. John, August 23 - (Special) - The police are hot on the trail of Collins the murderer of Miss McAulay, and believe he will be apprehended if indeed he is not already arrested.

A man fully answering the description was at South Bay on Tuesday, and was at Musquash last night.

The chief of police started for there today but the man had left Musquash two hours before he arrived.

Getting a description and the main direction he at once started in pursuit and no word has since been received.

The man will undoubtedly be captured and police are confident he will prove to be the murderer.

A JEALOUS MAN MURDERS WIFE

And Kills Himself - Deplorable Crime Which Has Occurred at Parry Sound, Ontario - Husband and Wife Had Been Disagreeing for Some Time.

PARRY SOUND, Ont., Aug. 23 - (Special) - A murder and suicide took place at Parry Harbor last night.

Henry Anderson, in a fit of rage and jealousy shot his wife dead at the door of a neighbor's house, then returning to his own home sat down and fired the pistol at

his own head, killing himself instantly. Anderson's family relations have not been happy for a long time past, and he is reported to have been cruel and overbearing towards his wife. He appears to have been subject to fits of violent jealousy, and the shooting was done when the man was in this state of mind.

VENSUELA FEARS A COUP D'ETAT

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Aug. 23 - Passengers arriving here from Venezuela report that President Castro's condition is alarming. It is feared that he has a complication of liver and kidney trouble. He is still confined to his bed.

General Gomez has made a hurried trip from Maracay to Macuto and there are rumors of a possible coup d'etat.

THE DOMINION HAD A LUCKY ESCAPE

HALIFAX, August 22 - Letters received here yesterday from the battleship Dominion state that she went ashore in Chaleur Bay on Friday night last at nine o'clock and that she remained aground for two hours and that her escape from serious disaster was remarkable.

The letters which were sent from Quebec on Monday implied that the ship would come to Halifax as soon as the festivities there in connection with the presentations of silver plate were over.

The Quebec Chronicle referring to the mishap to the battleship Dominion, in Bay Chaleur, says: "Louise Basin is to be examined by divers. She cannot, owing to her breadth, 78 feet, go into the Graving Dock, even if such a course was necessary. This is another argument in favor of a larger dry dock at this port."

There would be no such difficulty encountered in Halifax. The dry dock here is sufficiently large to accommodate the Dominion, with room to spare.

A MYSTERY IS AT LAST SOLVED

Lifeboat of S. S. Valencia. Wrecked Last January Found in a Cove.

VANCOUVER, B.C., August 23 - (Special) - The fate of the lost lifeboat of the steamer Valencia which was wrecked last January was solved by its discovery in a cave in a cliff with eight skeletons. These survivors of the awful marine disaster undoubtedly reached the shore safely and then starved to death.

NAVAL OFFICERS WERE DISMISSED

The Captain and Lieutenant of the Battleship Montague were Severely Censured and Punished.

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., Aug. 22 - The court-martial which tried Capt. Thomas B. Adair and Lieut. James H. Dathan, respectively commander and navigating officer of the British battleship Montague, which went ashore off Shumner Point, Lundy Island, May 20th, and severely reprimanded Capt. Adair and dismissed him from his ship and depriving him of two years' seniority.

LONDON, Aug. 22 - The verdict in the case of the loss of the battleship Montague is reported as just and as having been inevitable by all the morning newspapers, but great sympathy is extended to Capt. Adair and Lieut. Dathan on account of the admittedly difficult circumstances of the case and they are considered to be the victims of ill-fortune rather than carelessness.

Both were officers of excellent records, and the evidence showed that they were tired out by 48 hours, more or less, of incessant duty.

HAILEYBURY'S MAYOR IS BLAMED

Carelessness Responsible In Some Measure For Terrible Result of Recent Fire - Gasoline Five Engines Could not Be Used - There was no Fuel In the place

HAILEYBURY, August 23 - (Special) - When the conflagration which devastated this town started there was only a gallon of gasoline in the place so that the gasoline engine was put out of business in a few minutes as a result citizens met and have demanded the mayor's resignation. It is probable he will meet their wishes without delay.

MR BRODEUR ON THE SUBSIDIES

St. Hilaire, Que., Aug. 22 - Before an audience of at least 2,500 persons at an annual Rouville County picnic at Otterburn Park yesterday, Hon. L. P. Brodeur made some interesting declarations regarding the provincial subsidy. After congratulating the people of Rouville on the sacrifices they made to keep their schools up to the highest possible standard, he continued.

"Disturb those who demand the readjustment of the Federal subsidies. Many of the fathers of Confederation, its principal author even, would have preferred legislative union to provincial autonomy. That belief is not dead in Canada. Let us take care that the complaints of the provinces do not awaken it. Beware lest an amendment to the constitution for readjusting the Federal subsidy be made a precedent, a justification, for those who would like to ask this further amendment of the constitution; the transformation of our system into a legislative union. We must guard against shortsightedness. We must guard against the assaults that provincial autonomy may have to undergo in twenty-five or forty years. Let us shun everything that might weaken our rights, our dear-bought right to local liberty."

Mr. Alfred Girard, M. L. A., for the county, denounced the system of self-denial rents as a relic of medievalism. He objected also to the system by which the farmer alone bore the cost of maintaining the roads, which served the whole population, and to pay taxes on his land, when the man who put his money into loans and mortgages enjoyed his revenue untaxed.

ANOTHER SEARCH CREAMER CHILDREN

MONCTON, Aug. 22 - Constable C. H. Thomas and ex-Policeman Scott will return this week to Bayfield for another week's search in an effort to solve the Creamer mystery. Melvin Steeves, foreman of the I.C.R. freight shed has placed at the disposal of Messrs Scott and Thomas sufficient funds to pay their expenses at Bayfield for another week's search, and is confident of their ability to find the missing tots.

Mr. Thomas laughs at the idea of the Woodstock hypnotist who claimed that his subjects located the children while under his hypnotic influence.

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MEETING OF THE GOVERNMENT

To Arrange Autumn Program and for Tariff Conference, And Fill Vacancies.

OTTAWA, August 23 - (Special) - On Monday there will be a meeting of the Government to make the autumn programme including arrangements for the Provincial Conference, tariff revision and fixing dates for by-elections. It is possible also that a number of judicial vacancies will be filled.

SULTAN NEARING END OF LIFE

PARIS, August 22 - A communication emanating from the reform party at Constantinople will appear here tomorrow, asserting that the health of the Sultan of Turkey is gradually failing and that a fatal result shortly may be expected.

It is added the Abdal Hamid is fully aware of his condition, and desires to secure a successor who will follow out their presumptive brother, Mohamed Recharid, to be too liberal, which view is supported by His Majesty's entourage.

The communication also says that a plot is going on in the palace in which Abdal Hamid's advisors and the religious chiefs of the Mohau-medans are conniving at the disinheritation of Mohammed Recharid.

ARE IN REVOLT AGAINST PRIEST

DUBLIN, Aug. 22 - An extraordinary state of affairs reigns in the Keadee districts, County Roscommon, consequent on the action of the parishioners of the locality, who refuse to recognize the right of the parish priest Father Meehan, to appoint a teacher to the Greaghafarnach National school.

Some time ago Father Meehan, as manager of the school, appointed a stranger named Fleming, against the wishes of the people, who wanted the son of the former teacher, Gaffney, to be installed, said they should have a voice in the matter, and insisted on popular control of the school.

As the priest refused, scenes of violence ensued, and graves were dug outside the residences of Father Meehan and the teacher. The latter has a police escort to and from school, where the attendance has fallen off perceptibly owing to the people's determined stand. The Rev. Dr. Hoare, Roman Catholic bishop of the diocese, has excommunicated several leaders of the revolt.

REPLY MADE TO POPE'S ENCYCLICAL

PARIS, Aug. 22 - M. Clemenceau, Minister of the Interior, has not hesitated to make the Government's official reply to the Pope's recent encyclical on the separation of Church and State.

The reply takes the form of a circular to all prefects to seek rigorously all educational religious establishments which have remained open or have reopened despite the laws of July 1, 1901, and July 9, 1904. This means that the authorities will put into full force these laws definitely closing such educational institutions, as have hitherto escaped.

FREDERICTON HORSE RACES

St. John Aug 22 - The races at Fredericton yesterday afternoon attracted a lot of about 500 spectators, and proved interesting. The track was in a condition, and fine time was made. Bel-Chimes had partially a walkover 2:20 class win in it straight her Claudia Hal second.

The colt race was won by the G. hands down, but a heavy thunder storm made it impossible to complete the class. The two first heats of this event were captured by Little Egypt, but in the third heat Burline took a spurt and won. The race will finish today, and Burline is being backed heavily to win.

An unfortunate collision occurred soon after starting the third heat of the 2:30 class, putting Ruth Wilkes out of the race. She broke and shied before reaching the first turn, and made a bad mix-up. Ruth Wilkes sulky was badly damaged by striking the sulky of Belty Chimes, but Driver Cox saved himself from injury by jumping. The Truro mare was in good form, and the wishap undoubtedly lost her second money. The judges decided that the accident was unavoidable, but shut the Truro mare out. The best time made in this race was 2:18.

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
