...IMPROVEMENTS.—Among the many improvements of Souris that is rapidly going forward, that accomplished by J. J. Hughes & Co. this year, is worthy of notice. The store of this well-known firm, which has its frontage on Main Street, is modern and up-to-date. This large and commodious building, with the beautiful warehouse in the rear, is admirably situated and arranged for the taking in and sending out of goods, produce, etc., and the business going on in them has a tendency to make the most pessimistic "nothing doing" grumblers sit up and take notice. The firm are to be congratulated upon the large and systematically arranged warehouse which has quite recently been completed for the greater convenience of their business. This in itself is an ample proof that their business is becoming much larger and more prosperous. This splendid building is one hundred and fourteen feet in length and fifty feet wide, and is two storey high, having a six-foot post. The foundation is of solid cement. The cellar is over seven feet deep, the entrance to which is so arranged that a horse with a loaded cart may be driven in and out without difficulty. The lower floor is double, being made up of a soft wood floor underneath and hardwood planks, 1 1/2 inches thick on top. There are two entrances on the front; a single door and a large double door through which teams may drive with loads of produce to the Fairbanks scales just inside. The building reflects much credit on the architect, Mr. Philip Chaisson, who has had several years' experience in New York City.—P.

HANS SCHMIDT'S STORY IS TOLD

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Hans Schmidt's confession of the murder of Anna Ammuller was read today into the record of his trial, by Police Inspector Faurot, in command of the detective bureau. It was Faurot who arrested Schmidt, and to him the one time priest told the story. Leaving his chair, Faurot stepped before the jury box and by dramatic gesture and word re-enacted the scene of the confession. From his seat in the prisoner's box, Schmidt viewed the unusual scene with unchanged expression. 'I slapped Schmidt on the back when I first saw him,' said the inspector, 'and said "Come now, tell us the whole truth about the thing." Schmidt sank into a chair, buried his face in his hands, and began to cry. Presently he said, "I killed her because I loved her." "Before we left, Schmidt tried to embrace Father Quinn, but Father Quinn avoided him. Father Quinn asked: "Are you a regularly ordained priest of God?" and Schmidt replied, "I was ordained by St. Elizabeth."

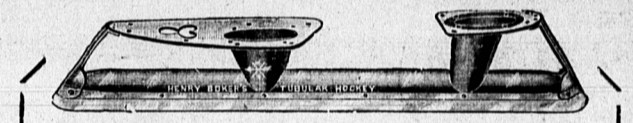

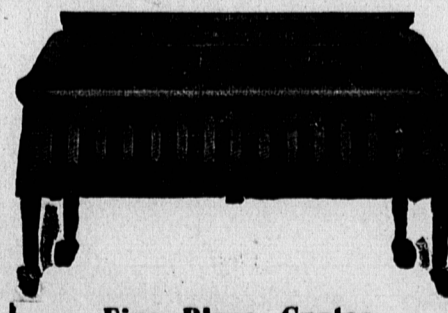
