**PLANE MANUFACTURED BY SUMMERSIDE GENTLEMAN.**—Mr. Reginald Pope, of Summerside, has the distinction of being the first Summerside gentleman to manufacture an aeroplane. The airship, a monoplane, was flown on Wednesday afternoon by Pilot Jones, of Moncton, who made a trip round the town in her. After he had made the flight, Mr. Jones remarked that the plane was very well designed, but would require a few adjustments to make it a perfectly balanced machine. Mr. Pope has been working on the plane for some months, every part of it being made by him in his garage. It is a pretty model, painted white with blue trimmings. The wings are of aluminum. It is 25 feet across, 17 feet long with a 30 horse power engine. Mr. Pope took the machine on a truck to the flying field at Mr. S. E. Cannon's farm. The wings were put on after they had arrived at the flying grounds. Mr. Pope is not yet proficient in the art of flying his own machine. He is very modest about the whole thing, but it is an achievement that any young engineer might well be proud of.—S.

### JOHN PAUL JONES PORTRAIT GIVEN TO COLLEGE

WILLIAMSBURG, Va., Aug. 17.—(U.P.)—The first memorial to John Paul Jones, founder of the United States Navy and a Virginian by adoption, is his portrait donated to William and Mary College by Charles H. Taylor, of the Boston Globe. The neglected old Jones home still stands in Fredericksburg, Va., near the railway depot. Today the home is used as a grocery.

John Paul Jones came to Fredericksburg in 1760. His brother, William Paul, is buried there.

### WESLEY RELIC

BROCKVILLE, Aug. 17.—A document signed by John Wesley, therein describing himself as "late fellow of Lincoln College, in Oxford and Presbyter of the Church of England," has been discovered in the possession of H. H. Arnold at Athens. Dated in 1784, it appoints Thomas Coke, Doctor of Civil Law and a Presbyter of the Church of England, to be Superintendent of Methodist missions in North America, and Wesley describes him as "a man whom I judge to be well qualified for that great work."

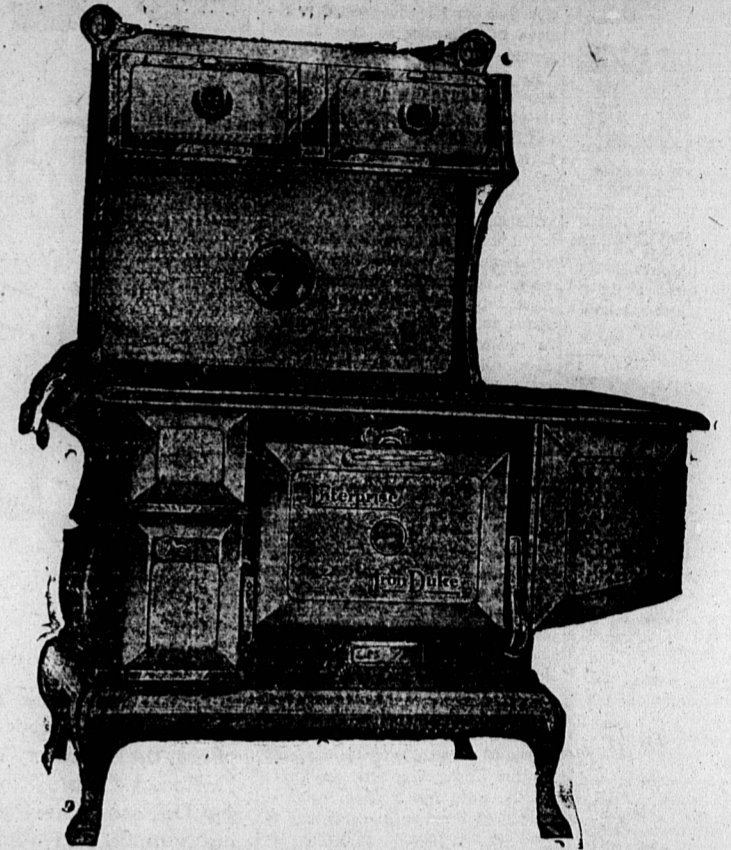

### NEW EDIBLE FRUIT DISCOVERED BY SCIENTIST

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 20 (U.P.)—Eight thousand specimens of tropical moths and butterflies, some believed unknown and some extremely rare, and news of a strange new fruit usable as food have been brought from the jungles of Ecuador by W. Judson Coxey, of the Philadelphia Academy of Natural Science.

At Banos he found the wild fruit which has some of the characteristics of the peach, orange, lime and tomato.

"Like an orange in shape," he said shortly after his return from the South American jungles. "It has a thinner skin covered with a peach-like fuzz. Its juicy pulp is filled with seeds resembling tomato seeds. The skin is green with red veins and the pulp is a vivid green. The juice, when strained, forms the base for a delightful drink already quite popular in the cafes of Quito."
