### ARMY FIELD SERVICE FUND

An enthusiastic meeting in connection with the "Army Field Service Fund" was held in New Glasgow Hall on Tuesday evening. J. H. Buntain, Esq., M.P.P., occupied the chair. Proceedings opened with "The Maple Leaf," sung by a choir of ladies.

Major A. A. Bartlett, in a clear cut address, dealt with the causes of the war and strongly pressed the duty of the people of Prince Edward Island, who had prospered so splendidly under the protection of Britain, to show their love and loyalty now in the Empire's hour of need.

He made a stirring appeal for contributions up to and even beyond what they considered their ability. Mr Bartlett's speech met with a splendid reception. Rev. E. Bell sang "O Canada" in splendid style, and received a well-merited ovation.

Mr T. C. James explained the different funds which were before the people of P.E. Island, and appealed for help to the particular undertaking now before the meeting, pointing out the fact that the Empire was standing as one man in the present war, and expressing his confidence that this Province would take no mean place in the fighting line.

Mr George Stevenson sang "Tenting To-night on the Old Camp Ground" with telling effect. Mr Justice Fitzgerald gave the address of the evening. He dealt with the causes of the war, and the manner in which Britain had been unwillingly forced into the fray, emphasising the fact that this is the old struggle of the divine right of autocratic rulers, against the liberties of freemen men.

We have had the privilege of listening to the learned judge on previous occasions, but never did he rise higher than in his address in New Glasgow Hall. The audience was thrilled throughout the address, and at the close there was a spontaneous burst of applause that must have been gratifying to the speaker.

Short addresses were given by Rev. John Stirling, Rev. E. Bell, Rev. Mr Crowe, Mr R. R. Bagnall and others, after which the lists were circulated, and although several of the leading farmers were unable to be present, 440 bushels of oats and \$52 in cash were subscribed. When the canvass is complete it will be found that New Glasgow will give a good account of itself.

A hearty vote of thanks was given to the visitors, and the meeting closed with the National Anthem.

It may be added that this district has already contributed to the Red Cross Fund, and is now engaged in an effort for the relief of the Belgians.
