PRIVATE FREDERICK MATHESON

Mr. Joseph Matheson, Wheatley River received a telegram from Ottawa on May 24th informing him that his only son No. 713220 Private Frederick Matheson, Infantry was officially reported killed in action on April 30th 1917.

Private Matheson enlisted in March 1916 in the 105th Battalion and was afterwards transferred to the 14th Royal Montreal Regiment and was among the first to go to France. Private Matheson was only twenty-two years of age, and was a splendid type of young manhood. Much sympathy is felt for his sorrowing relatives and friends.

The following letter was received from Lieut. Colonel of his Battalion: Headquarters 14th Canada Battalion Royal Montreal Regiment May 2nd 1917

Mr. Joseph Matheson Wheatley River P. E. I. Dear Sir:—You have doubtless

been informed before this of the death of Private F. Matheson which occurred during an intense bombardment of April 30th 1917. Private Matheson was a good soldier, and I can assure you that his loss is keenly felt by all who knew him. Canada has lost a good soldier, and all of us a brave and gallant comrade.

We hope in the years to come when time will have somewhat lightened this serious blow, the fact that Private Matheson died for his country, may prove of some consolation to you. I extend to you the sincerest sympathy of all ranks under my command.

WILL BOYCOTT KRONSTADT.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PETROGRAD.—Ten representatives of the so-called Kronstadt Republic, headed by the Vice-President of

the Republic, a private soldier named Liabovitch, held a conference in the Rinsky Theatre last night with the Petrograd council of Workmen's and Soldiers' delegates which is the only authority the Kronstadt Republic has recognized since it recently declared for the deposition of the Provisional Government and expelled its commissary.

The proceedings, during which Socialist Ministers Kerensky, Terentiev, Sabotloff and Tshernoff appeared, revealed the fact that the Petrograd council supports the cabinet in condemning the Kronstadt secession. The council proposed a resolution which paid a compliment to Kronstadt's devotion to the revolution but declared that Kronstadt's step conflicted with the general interests of the Democracy and threatened to lead to the disorganization and dissolution of the Empire.

The resolution summoned Kronstadt to return immediately to the ranks of the revolutionary Democracy.

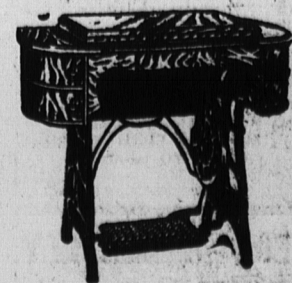
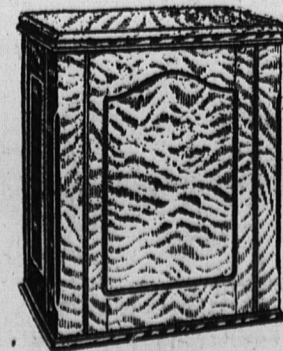
