—PROHIBITION CASE.—Before Judge McQuarrie at Alberton on Tuesday the 20th inst. Bella Jones of Brocton, Lot 4, was on information laid by George Barbour, prosecutor, convicted on a first offence against the Prohibition Act, and fined \$100 and costs. The new Prohibition Act provides that the Judge shall hear every case at either one of the two circuits in the county, nearest to the residence of the defendant. This is rather an awkward feature in the new act, as the cast has to be tried, always at the court nearest to the place where the defendant lives and there is no provision made for the Judge having to travel to the different circuits every time the prosecutor wishes to bring on a case. The old act provided that the Judge could hear the case at any of the circuits at any time. In conviction just obtained, this feature was met with by the prosecutor, who thought he could bring action at Summerside, but he found it would have to be tried at Alberton and Judge McQuarrie kindly consented to make a special trip for the purpose.—H.

STRUCTURE OF RED CORAL

The red coral that is used for necklaces is a horny axis which supports a number of soft-bodied animals or polyps, the entire structure bearing a strong resemblance to a small shrub. The fishermen, after they have brought this shrub-like colony to the surface, clean the soft animal matter away, preserving the red core or axis which is sold for the manufacture of jewelry. Although red coral contains lime, it is largely composed of a substance akin to horn, and like horn, it takes a fine polish. Animal substances of this nature almost invariably change their color when brought into intense heat.—Family Herald.
