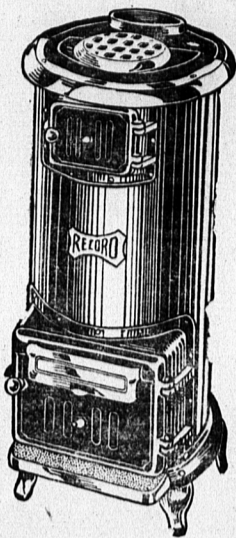

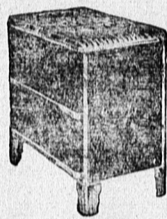

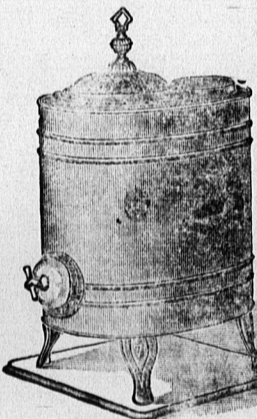

Beaverbrook Plaque Starts Dominion Tour In P. E. I.

The local Municipal Chapter of the I. O. D. E. this week inaugurates the Trans-Canada tour of the Lord Beaverbrook Plaque of Merit received by the Order in recognition of \$102,707 raised by the Chapters across Canada and sent to Britain for aircraft equipment.

The plaque, which is engraved Canadian nickel on an English oak base, will be exhibited in 35 centres from Charlottetown to Dawson City in the Yukon and will be on the road for six months. The Order has planned a gala send-off for it in this city in the interests of the aircraft fund which now totals well over \$221,940. This is in addition to the Bomber Fund which raised \$104,000 for the Canadian Government.

So well pleased was the British Ministry of Aircraft Production with contributions being made for the buying of various kinds of aircraft equipment, that Lord Beaverbrook, then Minister of Aircraft, had this beautiful Plaque of Merit sent to the Order, the only Canadian organization to receive such recognition from the British Ministry. "Fortifying the Cause of Freedom" is now the plaque describes the work of the Order in raising funds for England to "Sustain the Valour of the Royal Air Force."

The Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, is a well-knit organization, well equipped through executive committees in its many chapters across Canada to direct extensive war and patriotic works. Not only have considerable sums of money been made available through the Order for the many chapters and the women who act on committees right across Canada.

The exhibition of the Lord Beaverbrook Plaque is planned in response to wide interest not only in the Aircraft Fund but in the entire war service program of the all week in the window of G. H. Taylor, jeweller.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CHARLOTTETOWN GUIDERS' CLUB FOR 1940-1941.

The following report was given by Miss Lilian M. Duchemin, Captain at the annual meeting of the Charlottetown Guiders' Club, Friday night:

"In reviewing the activities of the Club for the past year I shall endeavour to make my report as brief as possible.

"Regular meetings of the Club were held the first Wednesday of each month from 7 to 8:30 p.m., at Guide Headquarters.

"Guide Day, October 26th, was observed by Charlottetown Guiders by the sale of War Savings Stamps throughout the City. The drive met with a very hearty response from the public and was a complete success, 3175 stamps being sold, in spite of the bad weather. We hope that our effort may be an inspiration to other organizations to assist in a similar way the sale of War Savings Stamps.

"In November the Guiders assisted in the preparation of the Christmas Seal Campaign for the Tuberculosis League, and in December they dressed over eighty dolls for
