THE NEXT FEDERAL ELECTION.

There are persistent rumors that a general election for the Dominion is not far distant, and there are also partial contradictions of any such intention on the part of those in power. There were many reports last year that an election was then near. Some actual preparations were made, campaign literature was sent out and friends of the Government were warned to be ready. But the election did not come. It is a year later now, which makes a good deal of difference. And Hon. Senator Thompson, who is a strong Liberal and close friend of the party leaders said the other day in England that "the Canadian election will be over before November."

The present Parliament was elected on November 7, 1900 and hence the five years term will not expire until November of next year. But four years comes nearer the average of our parliamentary terms than five years. There have been nine general elections within the past thirty seven years. No Government likes to run too close to the legal expiry of Parliament for fear of being forced to take the election at an unfavorable moment. History shows that in the three instances where the Government of the day kept back the election till the close of the Parliamentary term, or very near it, the outcome was unfavorable. Sir John Macdonald did so in 1872 and came back with but six majority. The following year he was forced to resign. Alexander Mackenzie gave him but four months margin when he appealed to the country and was beaten by a two thirds majority. Sir Charles Tupper ran out the full term in 1896 and was defeated at the polls.

It is all very well to say that the Cabinet has not considered the question. That only means that it has not been

formally considered on a day fixed for the purpose. But doubtless there has been ere this many interchanges of views on the subject. The House elected in 1898 was dissolved in 1900 by the Laurier Government. Things are prosperous now in Canada, and yet the shadow of commercial depression is creeping over other lands and probably may come our way. There is nothing to gain by waiting; the times are not likely to be more propitious a year hence than they are now and may be less so. It is in a general way a good time to appeal to the people, and that is why The Guardian looks for an election this year, probably before the snow flies.
