Among the old acquaintances we met at Montague on Wednesday was Dr. F. S. McDonald, 218-1-2 headed so many summaries in the long ago. We also had renewed acquaintance with James W. Mallard of New Zealand, who is the proud owner of Grace Vebell 2.06 by Symbol 3 Forest 2.02-1-2. She has been bred to Calumet Hopes 2.02 3-4 and Jimmie Hopes to have a world beater in this crossing.

The photo finish camera owned by W. R. Godfrey, Marshfield, who is assisted in its operation by Mr. Clow, made its first official appearance in the Maritimes at Montague last Wednesday afternoon. It is a special magic eye camera. Its exposure time is 1-3000 second but 1-1500 of a second was used throughout the day at Montague. To use it a light camera house must be installed opposite the judges stand and at a considerable height to permit the transference of carrier on wire run pictures to the judges. The finish wire is aluminum cable. Each picture shows the name of the track, the date, the class, the heat and winners, the camera being centered on wire photographed entire width of track. The photo finish was called for on two occasions and in both instances the leading horses finished so close together that only a high speed camera could decide the question. Pictures can be very different from what will be a matter of disputes as to winners wherever used.

Racing was high all over the Maritimes this week but locally George McIntyre's Montague and driven by Collins (Callbeck) who was on as expected by Talugi 2.13, owned by St. Croix Stables, Calais, Maine, and driven by Parvula 2.13, seven other starters, was in the second tier at the start of the first heat, finished a very close second and was also 2-2 in the following heats. Buddy Budlong (Stead) 3-3, Lynn Mite (Barnett) 3-5, seven other starters, best time 2:15. A rather bad accident happened in the first heat of this race when three horses, Tiny Budlong, Quick Link and Maudeine Budlong went down and pieces and bikes are difficult to purchase now.

The 222 Trot was a straight beat win for Eva Worthy, owned by Dr. P. McIntyre, Montague and driven by Collins (Callbeck) (L. Kelly) made it a close race and was 2-2. Three other starters, The Free For All was one of the most exciting races in a long time. Anti-Aircraft starting on the outside in the first heat seemed to be hopelessly out of it when they hit the back stretch the second time around, then he recovered speed stealing one of his quarters in 30 seconds and the half mile in 1:02 4-8 to head Kikavola, winning by a nose as shown in the photo finish camera. In the second heat he had an easy time of it but in the third white most everyone thought Anti-Aircraft had finished in the heat as he came very fast towards the close of the heat it was really Kavalas, as the photo finish camera showed. The fastest time was in the second heat—2:09.3-5. Anti-Aircraft is owned by C. H.

Zale, Graziano Pronounced Fit For Title Bout

CHICAGO, July 11 (AP)—Champion Tony Zale and challenger Rocky Graziano did some carefully observed breathing, muscle-flexing and squinting for the Illinois Athletic Commission today and then were pronounced fit as fiddles for their middleweight title bout at the Chicago Stadium next Wednesday night.

It was a study in contrasts as clean-shaven and somewhat tense Zale, and Rocky, with a stubbly chin and apparent nonchalance, submitted to a routine physical examination by Dr. John J. Drammics of the State Commission.

Dr. Drammics announced that Zale had a pulse of 78-106 against Graziano's 76-104 and the champion's blood pressure measured 118-55, compared with 114-60—all of which was "very good, very good."

George Young Enters Marathon Swim

TORONTO, July 11 (CP)—George Young, who first won international swimming fame 20 years ago, came back to Toronto today and immediately filed his official entry in the 10-mile marathon swim at the first post-war renewal of the Canadian National Exhibition.

Now 37 and a husky railway worker at Philadelphia, Young immediately headed for Roche's Point at nearby Lake Simcoe to enter training under the tutelage of Shier Mendelsohn, Toronto swimming coach.

Mendelsohn said the 185-pound Young would have to shed 20 pounds to be in top physical condition for the 10-mile grind late in August.

It was Young's surprise victory in the \$25,000 30-mile swim across the Catalina Channel off California Jan. 16, 1927, which led to the inauguration of distance swims as an annual Toronto sport feature.

Belloise Stops Abrams In Five Rounds Of Bout

NEW YORK, July 11 (CP)—Steve Belloise of the Bronx tonight stopped George Abrams in five rounds of a scheduled 10-heat boxing match at Madison Square Garden.

Belloise's victory wiped out a decision Abrams, a clever boxer, scored over him last year. Belloise, a rugged slugger with little boxing skill, weighed 159 3-4 and Abrams 161.

Assault And Stymie Meet In Race Today

NEW YORK, July 11 (AP)—Assault and Stymie bring their alternating act for racing's money-winning championship back to Jamaica tomorrow in the \$50,000 Butler Handicap and if Assault can carry loaded beer trucks as easily as the last time they tangled, he'll probably win the title back—this time for keeps.

As a result of his string of six straight wins since last November—four of them over Stymie—they're piling a back-breaking 135 points on the clubfoot comet this time, compared to 126 for his one-time Texas playmate, and daring him to go out and whip the four others in this mile-and-three-sixteenths meander. No horse—not even the great Discovery who toted 132—has ever won the Butler with that load.

Actually, this scramble is strictly a tune-up for next Saturday's \$100,000 Empire City International gold cup at Belmont, since all five of the entries tomorrow are eligible for that fancy feature.

HUNTERS' CORNER

Sea trout have been running strong in the past two weeks. They came surging in on the full moon tides during the last few days in June and early July, particularly in the streams along the North shore. Their reception was along the same lines that has been the order of the day for years past—a barrage of nets, 'jigs', and 'what have you'. Their serried ranks have been decimated and scattered until the cry is heard from legitimate anglers... where have the trout gone?

To this columnist it's a wonder we have any trout left. Wherever one goes, whether his early morning, mid day or late evening, it's a continual vista of parked cars and anglers wading the pools and streams in hopeful quest of the streamlined beauties. Its not the fishermen with bait or fly rods that are doing the damage... it's the poacher with net and 'jig' who cleans out a pool or section of good trout water in a few hours and then sells his catch for a few paltry dollars or bottles them for future use.

Here is a specific incident I'll relate to show what is going on in many of our best streams. On Wednesday afternoon, June 25th, it happened to be on a trout stream in western Prince County. It is patterned after the 'Big Brook' at Fortune in Kings county. It means a crooked, winding course through a marshy, grass grown alder studded valley. The water is deep, slow moving and many beautiful pools may be found bordered by open glades or hidden amid clusters of tangled alders.

The trout had apparently come in the night before and their arrival had not yet been made known. No foot prints marred the growth of thick green grass or showed in the bare patches of black mud. The sun was beaming down and the schools of trout had moved into the more shady pools. I stooped low and peered through a maze of alder roots into a 4 foot deep pool that also extended well under the over hanging bank. It took a few minutes for my eyes to adjust themselves and their vision penetrate the shadowed film that clouded the surface of the pool.

Suddenly, like as if a curtain had been pulled to one side, I saw the trout. They were not greatly disturbed at my appearance. Once in a while the massed formations would restlessly but not with sufficient momentum to disturb silt. I estimated approximately 300 trout in this particular pool. The bulk of them were trim, snub nosed one pounders but there were a score or more that would run the 3 pound mark very close if not go over it. Twice I glimpsed the tail of a monster trout that would measure a full 6 inches across as it fanned momentarily from the section of the pool that was hidden by the overhanging bank. I wouldn't attempt to judge the weight of this particular trout but 8 years ago a 7 1-4 pounder was taken from the open pool a few yards below the alder tangle.

I learned later that in the next two days a local fly fisherman took a couple of lovely catches of trout from this particular pool. In his first catch two weighed 2 lbs. each and six were 'even Stephens' at an even one pound. On the second visit it was the same thing of a smashing strike at almost every cast.

It was a different story on the third visit. When a score of casts failed to secure a single rise the fisherman got suspicious. The cause was not hard to find. A few yards above one of the best pools it was obvious that a net had been used. On either bank opposite each other were the marks made by upright supports. The grass in the vicinity was trampled as if by a flock of sheep and below the pool were two long poles that had been used to probe the cutbank pools and alder tangles.

The game warden visited this stream on Saturday evening July 5th. He found that the pool amid the alders where the big school of trout were lying on June 25th had been thoroughly netted early that morning. The dirty work had been done after the rain that had fallen during the night and early morning. Although the prospect of a return visit on Sunday morning was not too bright he again visited the pool at 5 o'clock on Sunday morning. His feelings may better be imagined then described when he found that the pool had again been netted and that he was about a half hour late... the culprit had come and gone leaving one long pole still lodged in one under the bank trout hide-out. On Monday morning he was back on the job at 8:10 A. M. just as the first hint of dawn was lighting the alder glades... but
