Bruins Beat Canadiens 5-3 In Overtime To Continue Unbeaten Pace

BOSTON, Feb. 4 (CP)—Two overtime goals gave Boston Bruins a 5-3 victory over Montreal Canadiens here tonight, running their National Hockey League unbeaten streak to 10 games.

A crowd of 10,000 saw Eddie Shore and Doc Clapper score in the first 60 seconds of overtime. The first goal was scored by Clapper, who had fought from behind to tie the game midway through the third period.

Shore's game-winning goal came 12 seconds after the overtime started when he came from the right to beat goalie Bert Campbell. Seconds later, Clapper intercepted a Canadiens pass near his own net, and went the length of the ice to score.

It was Clapper's 201st goal of his career. Before the game started, Mayor Stanley Lewis of Ottawa had presented him with the puck with which he scored his 200th goal in Toronto.

Canadiens, last team to defeat the Bruins, in Montreal Dec. 21, won a two-goal deficit and pulled into a 3-3 tie in the third when John Quilty poked the puck through a narrow opening behind

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (CP)—New York Rangers tonight retained the William J. MacBeth Trophy, emblem of the city hockey championship, by battling New York Americans to a 2-2 overtime tie in a National League game before 9,970 spectators.

Before this game the Rangers led four victories to one and the draw was sufficient to clinch the trophy as the teams met but twice more. The Rangers have won the trophy all three seasons that it has been in competition.

Rookie Bus Wycherly by scoring his first major league goal saved the day for the Americans who faced defeat with the last period more than half gone. Earlier in the same period Kirby McDonald, Ranger forward who was the all-star rookie last year but has done little this season, got his second goal of the year.

Buzz Boll put the Americans ahead in the first period, beating goalie Dave Kerr to a loose puck in the Ranger end, and Bryan Hextall tied it early in the second.

Eight Owners Unanimously Unite Against Kenesaw M. Landis' Latest Rule

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 (AP)—The eight members of the National League united unanimously today in opposition to the latest edict from Baseball Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis against return of players to the minor league after they have been purchased by major league clubs.

Still adhering to the secrecy which has surrounded the latest bulletin of the commissioner since it was issued Jan. 31, the league did not disclose its action officially, but it was learned that a committee composed of Branch Rickey of St. Louis Cardinals, Warren Giles of Cincinnati and Leo Boley of New York Giants was appointed to draft a resolution to be presented to Landis expressing the opposition of the major league club owners to his ruling.

The ultimatum that has drawn the ire of the clubs says that a player purchased by a big league club while he is subject to the baseball draft may not be returned to the minors on option unless waivers are obtained from all the other major league teams.

There was some question as to the extent of the rule's effect on the National League members. The Giants said none of their players would be affected, but Chicago Cubs said four of their players left in the clause of the ruling.

One of the latter is Lou Stringer, star second baseman for Los Angeles of the Pacific Coast League last year. He is a valuable ball player potentially, but the Cubs at present have Bob Herman, probably the best second baseman in the league, and normally would consider optioning Stringer to a class AA minor league club.
