RIENDSHIP TO GERMANY S PLEDGED

otable Oration Given by Aristide Briand from League Rost- rum.

GENEVA, Sept. 10.—Speaking from the rostrum of the League of Nations Assembly before a great audience, Aristide Briand, the French Foreign Minister, today delivered another notable oration during which he enunciated his conviction of the certainty that the rapprochement between France and Germany would continue to develop uninterrupted in the interest of peace.

M. Briand began by lauding Gustave Stresemann, the German Foreign Minister, who is representing Germany in the assembly. The French Foreign Minister alluded to Herr Stresemann's announcement that Germany would sign the compulsory clause of the world court of justice and wanted to be a pioneer in the movement for peace. M. Briand declared that this "noble discourse came as a ray of light to dissipate the mist."

LENINGRAD, Russia, Sept. 10.—Court decision is expected next Wednesday in the case of twenty-six alleged spies, charged with espionage in behalf of the British intelligence department. The group is headed by Albert Goyer, said to have been an international spy since 1916. It includes Professor Nikitin, employed in the chemical industry, several former navy employees of civil institutions, a 70-year-old woman accused of giving refuge to spies arriving from abroad, and an 19-year-old dancer, Dorimekova. Members of the organizations are alleged to have confessed to sending through officials of the Finnish consulate in Leningrad, data on the soviet navy, including plans of battleships and submarines, as well as mobilization arrangements.
