THE NEW GOVERNMENT SWORN IN YESTERDAY

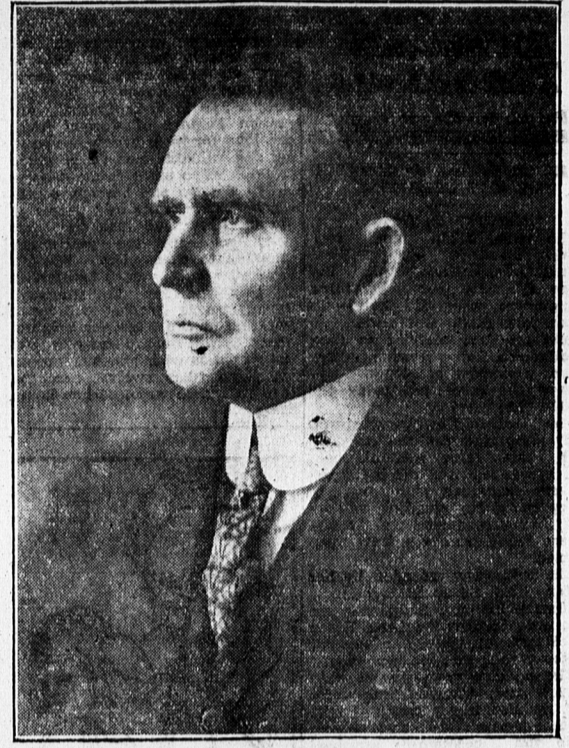

Ayrshire Breeders Held Their Picnic Yesterday Afternoon

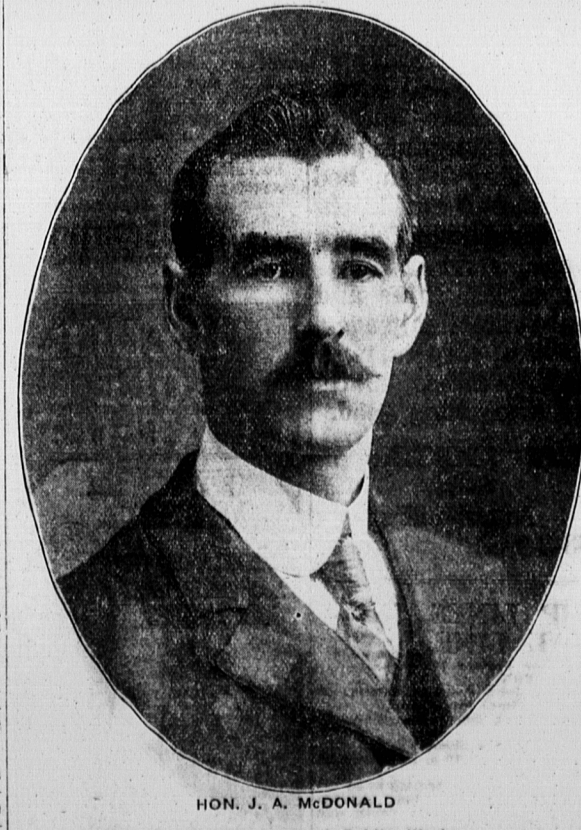

PRINCE TO DINE AS OTHER PASSENGERS

LONDON, Sept. 5.—The evening papers paid a good deal of attention today to the Prince of Wales on the eve of his departure for Canada. Papers point out the historical continuity of the assumption by His Royal Highness of the title, Lord Renfrew, which his grandfather used when visiting in the United States about sixty years ago.

There will be no ceremonial leave taking at Waterloo Station tomorrow evening when the Prince departs. The Evening News says the Royal suite on the Empress of France is on the port side of the ship, C. Deck, and is extraordinarily snug and comfortable. Painters and decorators have been working thereon since a week ago Monday and many improvements have been made in the suite. All new furniture has been installed and a new sitting room for the Prince's use has been decorated in blue and gold. It contains a dozen drop-top seascrapes by Wylie, the artist.

No special table has been reserved for the Prince in the first class dining saloon, where he will take his meals the same as the other first class passengers.
