In reference to the synopsis of the will of the late Hon. Thomas W. Dodd, published on Monday, the GUARDIAN is requested to state that Mrs. Dodd's bequest of \$35,000 is given to her absolutely, also Mr. Dodd's late residence (taxes insurance and repairs thereto to be paid out of the estate) and household furniture, etc., for her life. Mrs. Dodd does not share in the residue of the estate. Mrs. Mahon's bequest of \$35,000 is given to her absolutely, also the home occupied by Mrs. Dodd and household furniture, etc., after her death, and an equal share with Dr. Dodd in the residue of the estate. The bequest for the maintenance and education of Frederick Walker Ings, is \$5000, not \$3000 as stated.

The Presbyterian Witness says: "Civil government is an ordinance of God. It is a base and wicked thing to treat it as a commodity to be bought and sold. Each voter is a trustee for the whole people; he is not at liberty to sell his vote; he must vote as conscientiously as a jurymen in a court of justice. The jurymen who sells his verdict is infamous, and so in truth is the elector who sells his vote. What would you say of the man who would gleefully lay his pins to buy a verdict from a jury of his countrymen? Not better is the party that undertakes to corrupt the electors. What would you say of officials in court who would coolly steal the jury's verdict and reverse it? Not better are men who undertake to miscount or destroy or 'switch' the electors' ballots. The sentiment of honest men of all parties will insist that the counting of ballots shall be correct, and that there shall be no buying or selling of votes."
