Annual Meeting East Prince Liberal Ass'n

The annual meeting of the East Prince Liberal Association was held in the Capitol Theatre, Summerside, yesterday afternoon and was addressed by the Hon. Paul Martin, Minister of National Health and Welfare. Mr. George MacKay of Albany, the president of the Association presided and the speaker was introduced by Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, member of Parliament for Prince and parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries. In his opening remarks Mr. Martin spoke in complimentary terms of Mr. MacNaught and said he had watched the zeal with which he looked after the interests of his constituency. He said that the office of parliamentary assistant is considered a training ground for the Cabinet and when one receives an appointment as a parliamentary assistant it indicates that those in authority look upon him as a person showing promise. He also referred to Senator B. W. Robinson as having made a mark in the Upper Chamber and said he was pleased to see that his health was continuing to improve. Mr. Martin spoke with high praise of the career of Mr. MacKenzie King and referring to his successor Mr. St. Laurent he said, "I doubt if in public life Canada ever had as able a man as the present prime minister." He dwelt at length on the accomplishments of the Liberal Party particularly in the realm of social legislation. He described the benefits accruing from the family allowance program and referred

briefly to the government's new health program. At the conclusion of Mr. Martin's talk a vote of thanks was moved by Mr. C.C. Baker, M.A. seconded by Mrs. Aden Mulligan, Kinkora and supported by the Hon. George Barbour, Minister of Highways and the Hon. A.W. Matheson, Minister of Health. Before Mr. Martin arrived the election of officers was held and other business transacted. Mr. George MacKay was re-elected president and the following other officers were chosen to serve with him: Vice president, 3rd district, W. G. Phillips; vice president, 4th district, John A. Smith; vice president, 5th district, Donald Baker, executive; 3rd district, P.M. Arsenault, Beecher Best, Harold Mill; 4th district, James Marchbank, A. W. MacKay, Eldon Drummond; 5th district, Lloyd Gorrell, Frank Squarabriggs, Edward Lockard, Secretary, G.H. Phillips. Resolutions were unanimously passed expressing regret at the resignation of Prime Minister King and wishing him every measure of health in his retirement, offering congratulations to Prime Minister St. Laurent, expressing confidence in the leadership of Premier Jones and expressing congratulations to Mr. MacNaught on his appointment as parliamentary assistant. Mr. James McCardie of Middleton who was one of the delegates to the national Liberal convention from Prince County gave a very interesting and comprehensive report of the activities of that convention. - S
