**That Body of Hours**

**REST AND SLEEP MORE IMPORTANT THAN FOOD FOR THE VERY ACTIVE CHILD**

The youngster may be returning to school after holidays spent outdoors and despite his improved appetite and eating more food, there has been little or no gain in weight. This is naturally discouraging to parents of underweight children. If the youngster has spent his vacation in a ooy's rowing and paddling, there may be an actual decrease in weight but an increased firmness of muscles.

Younger children just reaching school age should be gradually increasing in weight. If not, parents should try to find the reason. It will be found in some cases that there are infected teeth and tonsils and these conditions should be corrected before the child begins school after the holidays.

An attempt to increase the weight of the youngster by forcing him to eat more food which may be helpful harmful and physically taxing.

In speaking of the underweight child Dr. Henry Dietrich, in Southwestern Medicine, says that should not be put on a diet and given forced feedings nor should he be treated with gland extracts.

It is better to let the child grow naturally and physically more active than the average child with no infection or physical defects, who is somewhat underweight, and eats poorly at the proper time, in such a case we must refer to the average child who must carry on each day the school work which takes up the child's time. Fatigue—tiredness—occupies an important place in the complaints of school children, and for children up to six years a noon-day nap of 1 1/2 hours is necessary.

The youngster who then with the faster than the average is that underweight may be due to over-activity and tiredness. The treatment is not more food, more rest and sleep, as suggested by Dr. Dietrich.

**Stocks Rally Near Close In New York**

NEW YORK, Aug. 22 (AP)—The stock market attempted to keep on the recovery route today but was sidetracked by early selling in motors and recently strong industrials.

There was a comeback at the close when early losses running to a point or so were reduced several points. The market closed substantially in many cases and but the Associated Press report on the day was off 2 of a point at 48.5.

The slump was accomplished on the smallest turnover for a full session since June. Investors amounting to only 396,620 shares compared with 825,680 Friday.
