Budget Expected Next Thursday

Some Changes Looked For In The Income Tax, While Little Or No Tariff Changes Contemplated

OTTAWA, Ont., Mar. 24.—(By the Canadian Press)—The Easter adjournment finds the Ontario and Quebec Parliamentarians absent from the Capital; but due to the brevity of the recess this year Western and Maritime members are for the most part remaining here. Today political observers were endeavoring to penetrate the veil which shrouds the forthcoming budget. The probability is that E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Finance, will present his first budget to the House of Commons on Thursday night. What it is likely to contain remains an absolute secret.

PICTURE OF DE VALERA'S DESOLATION IN REPLY COMING STORM AREAS END OF WEEK

LONDON, England, March 24.—(By the Canadian Press)—Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald will not go to Loughmoe for Easter, but will remain close to London in case of political developments. No special Cabinet meetings are planned, however.

Task Of Rehabilitating Sections Slashed By Last Monday's Storm Has Begun.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Mar. 24.—With most of the 350 dead buried and hundreds of injured receiving treatment, government agencies and private citizens joined hands with the Red Cross today in the task of rehabilitating the areas slashed by Monday night's tornadoes.

Preparing For The Opening Of Navigation

QUEBEC, Que., March 24.—In preparation for the opening of navigation the Government ice-breaker N. B. McLean will sail from here at daybreak on Saturday to begin the annual ice patrol in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the local agency of the Department of Marine announced today. The McLean will work with the Montcalm, which already has made a cruise of several hundred miles around Gulf waters.

Great Britain Will Continue India Program

LONDON, March 24.—Great Britain intends to proceed without deviation with its programme for India, Sir Samuel Hoare told the House of Commons today, and will not be deflected from it "by threats of force or sudden alarm."

NEW RECORD TOTAL OF WOOL HANDLED

Canadian Cooperative Wool Growers Handled Close To 5,000,000 Pounds In 1931.

TORONTO, Ont., Mar. 24.—New record total of close to 5,000,000 pounds of wool was handled by the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers during 1931, it was reported to the annual meeting here today. Stocks were entirely cleaned up and highest current prices paid shippers.

LITTLE BEING ACCOMPLISHED AT CONFERENCE

SHANGHAI, Mar. 24.—(AP)—Another session of the Sino-Japanese peace parley ended today without definite accomplishment and troops in the field went on strengthening their lines.

Sino-Japanese Peace Parley Delegates Hopeful Of Satisfactory Agreement.

Another colorful ceremony was held in St. Peter's this afternoon. A Cardinal known as the grand penitentiary seated himself at the tribunal of penitence and heard the confessions of the priests who are confessors in St. Peter's. Then confessions finished, he tapped them sharply on the head with a long wand, this commemorated the old penance which customarily was done in public.

Fire Breaks Out While The Pastor Addresses People

Interior Of Beautiful First Baptist Church At Amherst Entirely Destroyed With A Loss Of \$75,000

AMHERST, N. S., March 24.—Fire breaking out tonight while Rev. F. L. Orchard was addressing a gathering in the vestry of First Baptist Church, entirely destroyed the interior of the beautiful brick and stone structure with a loss of \$75,000. A new heating system had been installed a few days ago, and when the smell of smoke first became apparent, it was thought to be simply the result of the covering on a new piping. Mr. Orchard, however, placed his hand on the wall behind him, and found it scorching hot.

General Strike Vote Called
