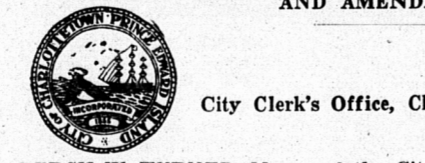

LEGISLATION UNIFORMITY IS ADVOCATED

Insurance Officers Present Brief To Rowell Commission.

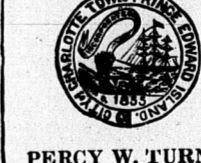
BY CARL REINKE Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA, Jan. 18.—(CP)—Simplification of control and taxation of Canada's financial institutions to eliminate waste in the national economy was urged again upon the Rowell Commission today by spokesmen for the trust and loan companies and fire and casualty insurance companies.

J. A. Mann, for the Federation, estimated savings by such centralization would amount to \$1,000,000 a year. To eliminate duplication of taxation and reduce administrative costs, D'Arcy Leonard, for the Dominion Mortgage and Investments Association, suggested some kind of permanent bureau or secretariat to make a continual study of taxation in Canada.

The different taxing authorities might establish a joint commission or hold an annual conference as a means of exchanging information and coordinating their taxing efforts, he suggested. "Governments should attempt to minimize duplication," Mr. Leonard urged.
