MINK SHIRTS NOW

NEW YORK, April 7 — (AP) — Now it's mink shirts. A men's store advertised shirts made of mink, 20 per cent muskrat and the rest virgin wool—at \$14.50 each.

It seems that Sgt. MacDonald was on leave in England and when he returned he was informed he was drafted for home next day and so the fact he wore the stripes of a sergeant his name was not listed. Sgt. P. A. MacDonald is a son of Mr. and Mrs. William MacDonald who had five sons in the army.

It has been the home of vicereignty since Confederation — the government bought it in 1868 — but even in Ottawa thousands have caught only a glimpse of it in passing. Others have never seen it behind its trees and its iron fence two miles down the Ottawa from the parliament buildings.

In 1914 a new sort of Montreal limestone was erected in 18th century classical style, derived from the Greeks. To the layman, it presents itself as a somewhat homely three-story building, red-tiled, aloof, something from another age.

Within it has Victorian England deep within its walls and its corridors and within its atmosphere.

It has 75 rooms, among them a great, carpeted ballroom, reception room, libraries, massive pictures of former Kings and former governors-general hang here and there, dominating the lesser things upon the walls.

In normal times it is the place where the first people of the land play host to their guests. As many as 4,000 guests have crowded its rooms and its lawns. Balls, skating parties, curling bonanzas, investitures have dotted its occasions.

Now that peace has returned that social whirl will probably engage Viscount Alexander more than any previous governor-general. For this Canada of 1946 has come a long way since Thomas MacKay built his "Castle" in 1838, but in no seven years has the town more its international and diplomatic stature than those between 1839 and 1946.
