The Supreme Court was all day yesterday engaged in trying an action brought by Leon Dolron and his son Francis Dolron against Roger Simpson. The action arose out of a purchase of a horse by the plaintiffs from the defendant which horse was afterwards taken away from them under a Bill of Sale given by a prior owner who had sold the horse to the defendant. The plaintiffs claimed that the defendant was liable under a breach of warranty of title claiming that from representations made at the time of purchase that a warranty had been given. The defendant denied that any such warranty had been given and that he had simply sold the horse as he had got him subject to any prior claims. A number of witnesses were examined on both sides and the jury after a short absence fixed the value of the horse at \$60.00 for which amount they found a verdict for the plaintiffs. Johnson K.
