RUSSIA'S TROUBLES

The Czar, the Government and people of Russia are all in sore trouble. The Czar, who has been led into a disastrous war at the instance of the grand ducal party, probably feels a real desire to do something to relieve the distress of his people, but finds the much discredited bureaucrats still too strong for him. He fears for his life, for his dynasty, and so doubt for Russia herself. He fears to continue the war lest it result in worse disasters than have already befallen his country. Equally he fears to make peace on the only terms now possible, lest the humiliation and loss of prestige may shatter his autocratic power. As for the people, the masses, they know not what to do. They know that they are oppressed and ground down, but they have little conception of what is the nature of liberty such as we enjoy and know still less how it is to be obtained. The more intelligent reformers realize that any real and comprehensive scheme of reform cannot be carried out until the war is ended.

Seldom if ever has a vast and mighty empire been placed in conditions of such trouble and perplexity within and without in so brief a space. A little more than a year ago Russia was the haughtiest and conceited herself to be the mightiest of the great powers of the earth. The war has changed all that. The destruction of her fleet, the capture of her strongholds, the long succession of humiliating defeats and disasters sustained by her armies, and the present almost hopeless outlook for retaining her lost military prestige have been brought about within little more than a year. Yesterday her name was mighty on the earth. Today the name and fame of Russia are a byword and a reproach among the nations. And yet it must be observed that the real power of Russia is not broken. Her principal territories are intact, unassailable Russia, if her people were but free and united, would be invincible against the attack of not only any single power, but against any possible combination of powers.

In the war with Japan she has been placed as the greatest possible disadvantage by reason of immense distance from the seat of conflict and the insuperable difficulties of communication. It is only her ill-starred and unrighteous aggressions in the far East that have been checked. Japan cannot threaten Russia, will not under any circumstances attempt the invasion of a country of the magnitude of the North. It may be demanded whether Russia will not yet prove the stronger and the greater for the failure of her aggressive measures in the East. She has territory enough, and would have scope for all her energies within the bounds of her present possessions. Certainly it will rebound to her future greatness and glory if by well-considered and judicious internal reforms measures are taken to give freedom and representative institutions to her people. They are naturally a cohesive body. Her vast territories are compactly possessed almost boundless resources. With just and equitable government which would unite her people as one and at the same time give them prosperity, Russia would speedily regain her lost prestige and recover from her disasters. In any case, whether by national concessions the Czar shall yet establish his throne in the favor of the people or whether the autocracy shall be overthrown and a free government take its place, there must yet be a bright future for Russia.

We certainly have no desire to misrepresent The Examiner in regard to its attitude on the tunnel question. Our first desire is that press and people shall work unitedly to obtain redress for our present grievances and relief from our disabilities. We are entirely at one with The Examiner, and are pleased to find it so nearly in accord with the resolutions of the Market Hall meeting, in asking that the appointed delegates shall make it their first duty, to secure a suitable and efficient winter steamer and after that to lead every effort to secure the construction of the tunnel. With regard to the immediate departure of the delegates to Ottawa there are some obvious reasons for the delay that has occurred. A crisis of some gravity is still unsolved at Ottawa. This might not therefore be the most timely moment to secure a calm and effective hearing of our claim. The Provincial Government has not yet appointed delegates to co-operate with those named at the provincial meeting. Besides, some business men of the delegation have private affairs to attend to before leaving home for a week or two of absence. The time for the departure of the delegates will doubtless be so arranged as to reach Ottawa before the final supplementary estimates are brought down.
