J. F. Chapin, advance agent of Torrie Bros Moving Pictures and High Class Vaudeville Co., was in the city Sunday and yesterday afternoon left for Summerside where his company will play on Friday and Saturday nights of this week.

John M. Pooley, formerly of Tryon, P. E. I., and Miss Drucella Melvina Scott, both of Carross, were married at the Methodist parsonage in Skagway, Yukon Territory, on Monday May 28th, Mr. and Mrs. Pooley are now at home to their friends at Carross where they are both well known and very popular. The groom was one of the early locators of Windy Arm mining property and is a man of means.

At a meeting of the executive of the Provincial Government held on Thursday, John M. Clark, M. L. A., of Summerside was appointed a member of the executive, vice Hon. George Gadsden resigned. Mr. Clark was sworn in and took his seat. Drs. Toombs and Gallant reported that the Fort Augustus and Bastion districts, respectively, were free from small-pox and all houses released from quarantine. The matter of the encroachment of the railway on the Government property at the foot of Prince Street was discussed and referred to the Attorney-General, with a view to having the rights of the province properly protected. An understanding has been practically arrived at between the Government and the railway, whereby the latter agrees to make a suitable winter landing on the east side of the Ferry wharf. Permission was given the railway to lay a pipe line along lower St. Peter's Road, so as to convey water from the spring on the Connolly property to the railway works. The removal of the British Admiralty survey headquarters from Charlottetown, was brought before the meeting. It was pointed out that \$20,000 was annually spent in Charlottetown on account of the headquarters being here. It was decided to obtain additional information and forward a memorial to the Imperial Government asking that the headquarters be retained here. The new jails for Prince and Queen's counties were discussed. An offer from the city of an additional piece of land for the site of the jail here, making in all six acres, was accepted. The plans for Queen's county jail were considered, and it was decided to rebuild the court house and jail at Summerside. The appointment of fire wardens at Montague was approved of. The following appointments were made: Commissioners of deeds, Benjamin Rogers, James F. White, Albion, E. W. Tanton, Heath E. Strong, Summerside, Charles Ives, Montouche, Gustavus Clay, Dundas. The bell buoy on Point Prim will be replaced by an automatic gas buoy. A new gas buoy larger than the present one will be placed on Misconche shoal.
