Millionaires In Eastern Canada Final

Swamp Hull Volants 7-3 To Make Clean Sweep Of Best-of-five Series

OTTAWA, March 27—(CP)—Sydney Millionaires knocked Hull Volants out of the Allan Cup playdowns with a 7-3 victory here tonight over the Ottawa and District Champions. Tonight's victory gave Millionaires, Maritime titleholders, the series in three straight games.

Sydney swamped Volants with a three-goal spurge in the last minute of play after the Hull squad had held them to a narrow lead throughout the game.

With the score 4-3 for the Maritimers and one minute to go, Volants collapsed and in the final minute two goals by Steve Latoski and one by Grant Hall, both forwards, clinched the game and the series.

Sydney's spurge came when Hull, in a desperate effort to knot the score, yanked goalie Aurel Bordiceanu from the net and replaced him with long shots, while the Hull team stood defenceless.

Sydney now enters the Eastern Canada finals against either Montreal Royals or Toronto Marlboros. Millionaires moved out in front at the 4:50 mark in the first period when Aitchison back-handed the puck past Aurel Bordiceanu after taking Jack Fritz's blue line pass.

Bobby Walton made it 2-0 for Millionaires 10 minutes later when he combined with George Snell and Jimmy McCreeley on a three-way passing attack. Patsy Guzzo, shifty little Hull wingman, put his team in the scoring column 27 seconds before the end of the period when he combined with line-mates Eddie Finnigan and Ab Chollette to beat Dickie.

Each team counted once in the second frame, Sydney scoring first after eight minutes of play when Snell framed in Walton's pass. Six minutes later Pete Devine collected Hull's goal from a deuce in front of the Sydney net. Finnigan was credited with an assist.

Walton scored what was to prove the winning goal in the seventh minute of play in the final period when he combined with Snell to

collect his second goal of the game. Devine notched his second counter goal for Volants at the 17:37 mark when he deflected Guzzo's shot into the net. Guzzo and Finnigan drew assists on the goal.

Steve Latoski scored two of Sydney's final three goals. Remi Van Daele drawing an assist on the first and Grant Hall assisted by Aitchison got the other.

Red Wings Take Hawks By 3-1 count

DETROIT, March 27—(CP)—Detroit Red Wings, scoring a goal in each period, took the first game of their best-of-three semi-final Stanley Cup series from Chicago Black Hawks here tonight, 3-1.

The injury-riddled Hawks seldom found their game a match for the Wings, and the score might have been more lopsided except for the spectacular net-minding of Sam Lo Presti.

After holding out for almost the entire first period, Lo Presti was spilled in the final second of play as Sid Abel, Detroit forward, rammed home the puck on a pass from Don Grosso and Syd Howe.

Midway in the second period, Carl Liscombe tallied the Wings' second score, by taking a pass from Alex Motter and firing from 20 feet out.

Mush March connected for Chicago's only score at 6:15 of the final period. A little more than 10 minutes later, Joe Fisher and Liscombe, jipping a pass from Motter between their sticks, moved onto Lo Presti for Detroit's final score. Both players were in the clear, and Fisher shot home the puck.

A sparse crowd of 7,030 fans watched the battle, which was rough throughout. Referee Frank (King) Clancy assessed six penalties, two of them against Chicago defenseman Johnny Mariucci.

Although Detroit's prize rookie, goalie Johnny Mowers, gave a consistent performance at turning back Black Hawks' shots, the smiling Lo Presti gave the fans the more spectacular exhibition; time and again while the Wings riddled the Hawks' defence, Lo Presti dived after almost impossible shots from virtually every sector of the rink.

The Wings, victors in six or eight games during the regular hockey season with the Hawks, move to Chicago for the second game of the series Sunday night.

Bruins Down Toronto 2-1 To Square Series

MAPLE LEAF GARDENS, TORONTO, March 27—(CP)—Boston Bruins crashed back to a favorable position in the Stanley Cup race as they downed Toronto Maple Leafs 2-1 here tonight. The victory evened the best-of-seven semi-final Cup round to two wins each.

The Bruins, victims of two successive trouncings at the hands of the Leafs, had to fight desperately to carry out their boast to return to Boston for the fifth game Saturday with the series all square. Herbie Cain fired the winning goal after eight minutes of play in the third period.

The victory proved costly to the National Hockey League champions as it was feared by club physicians that Bill Cowley, the league's scoring champion, was lost for the balance of the season.

Injured in the first game of the round, Cowley played with his right knee tightly laced. In his second turn on the ice in the first period he was checked lightly by defenseman Jack Church and fell to the ice in pain, the knee injury being seriously aggravated.

The winning goal followed the puck into the net and the red light did not flash immediately. Cain's first shot hit Broda's chest and he picked up his own rebound to cut off M. Reavy started the play-off play, making a rink-wide pass to Cain after checking Church at the blue line.

A crowd of 14,824 fans saw the Bruins go in front early in the second period. Porky Dumart scored, coming in fast from the left side, after Milt Schmidt dumped a perfect pass ahead of him.

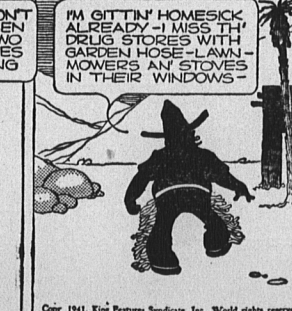

FISH STOCKING IN NATIONAL PARKS

are becoming well established.

The distribution of rainbow trout has been made from hatcheries maintained in the parks. Stocking operations were conducted in Banff Jasper, Waterton Lakes, Yoho and Riding Mountain National Parks.

Fish hatcheries are operated in the Banff and Waterton Lakes National Parks, with a sub-hatchery at Jasper. These hatcheries play an important part in maintaining the supply of game fish, not only in the mountain parks, but also in provincial waters, for in addition to the eggs hatched for distribution in the parks, a large number are carried for the stocking of provincial lakes and streams outside the parks.

A new phase of the parks' hatchery operations is the liberat on of larger fish developed from fry in rearing ponds. These stand a better chance of survival than do those released soon after hatching.

Since 1938 adult bass have been introduced into Lake Wapiti in Prince Albert National Park, where previous examination of the lake indicated that such stocking stood a good chance of success. A recent check-up indicated that the bass were progressing favourably, and
