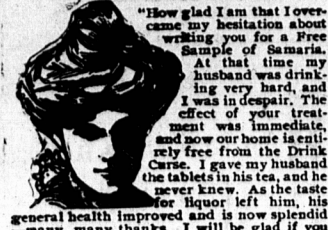

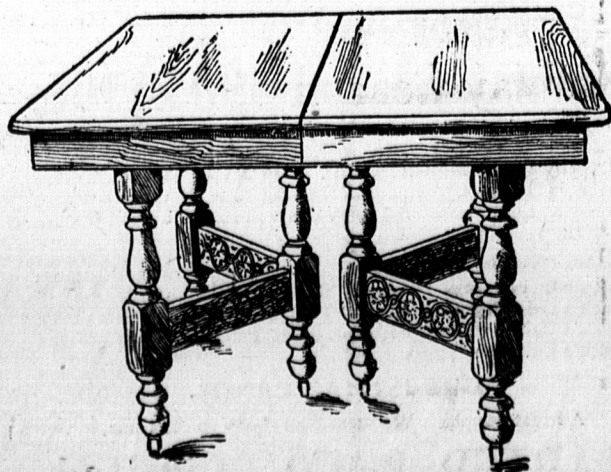

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES.

The poor are always with us and their wants are greatest during the cold season. So far there has been a want of organization to deal with this important matter. Each church is supposed to have some arrangement for looking after and supplying the wants of those of its members who may be in need. The national societies do good work in the same line and some of the benevolent and fraternal societies also render assistance, while charitably disposed persons are constantly doing something for needy cases personally known to them or brought to their notice. But from the lack of organization and inquiry it is to be feared that some persons of the most deserving class may suffer without their needs being made known, while others, less deserving and not too modest to solicit alms on the street or from door to door receive monetary assistance, or food, clothing or fuel from a number of sources quite unknown to each other. It is quite certain that the amount contributed for the poor is not distributed in proportion to the actual needs of these who receive it.

In most cities there is an organization known as Associated Charities, or by some similar name which keeps a record of all persons known to need charitable assistance. Its members furnish information as to those in need, or in doubtful cases cause inquiry to be made. Charitably disposed persons may make their donations for the poor to the association with the full assurance that the assistance furnished or the funds supplied will not be misappropriated, or one of the needy receive a double portion from several sources, while others equally needy and deserving are overlooked.

Such an association would be formed by representatives from the various churches and societies. It would not necessarily interfere in any way with private or church benevolence, and would afford the means of finding out who are in need and supplying their needs in a systematic way. It would also afford the means of exposing imposture and fraud which are found to exist in almost every city, and which frequently operate to dry up the fountains of charity. We believe such an organization is needed in this city.

Archbishop Langevin has appealed to the Roman Catholics of Saskatchewan to support the ministerial candidates in the coming election. This rather extraordinary course will no doubt affect the voting materially in two ways. It will tend to throw the Catholic vote as desired by the Archbishop and at the same time will tend to rally to Mr. Haultain's standard the large number of those who are opposed to ecclesiastical interference in elections. It may be doubted whether the new Government will be materially strengthened at the polls as a result of Archbishop Langevin's appeal.

We print with pleasure this morning a letter to Premier Peters from Stipendiary Inman of Montague giving details of recent prosecutions under the Canada Temperance Act in Kings County. As the strictures printed in The Guardian were of an earlier date than the convictions recorded by Mr. Inman we are inclined to take some credit to this journal for the increased activity rather than blame for having spoken too strongly. In any case we desire to give full credit to all in Kings and other counties as well, who are honestly endeavoring to bring to justice the violators of the Temperance Act.

FOR PRESS INDEPENDENCE.

R. L. Borden, leader of the Opposition uttered some timely words the other day in Toronto touching the attitude of the party press towards public questions. He pointed out that the real decisive debate which settles the attitude of parties takes place, not in Parliament but in the party caucuses, behind closed doors. For that reason the debates in the Commons lose very much of their interest. The men who in the caucus differed from the majority, usually remain silent in the public discussion on the floor of the House. For this reason he argued that it is the clear duty of the press of all shades to express its honest convictions in regard to all questions of public interest. It is gratifying to know that both Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Borden are favorable to a much more frank and free expression of opinion by the press than has hitherto been exercised by the party journals. This attitude on the part of the leaders is having a beneficial effect, and the independent expression of honest conviction is growing rapidly. The days of the hide-bound party journal are past.

The Canadian Magazine for December begins with some well illustrated literature relating to the Christmas season, and contains a large number of engaging articles, poems and stories from a score or more of the best Canadian writers. A new serial story from the pen of Mrs. Campbell Praed, an Australian writer of note is announced to begin with the new year. Among other topics to be discussed in the near future is the union of the Maritime Provinces. On this subject the Canadian's announcement contains this passage: "The problems confronting the small Provinces on the Atlantic grows larger as the years go by. A union of the three Provinces seems almost a necessity—it is union or torpor, say the advocates of the former." There will be a wide and general dissent from this opinion in P. E. Island, but we see no good reason why Nova Scotia and New Brunswick may not unite their fortunes if they feel so disposed.

PIERCED FIVE-INCH PLATE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 2.—What an 8-inch armor-piercing shell fired at a distance of 1,500 yards will do to the side of an armored cruiser protected by a 5-inch armor plate on a protective deck nearly three inches thick, was demonstrated by a test at Indian Head, Maryland. The shell pierced the 5-inch plate, went through the inclined protective deck and buried itself in the coal bunkers.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, except sections 2 and 3, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or an individual 21 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.
Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district, in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him.
The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:
(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
