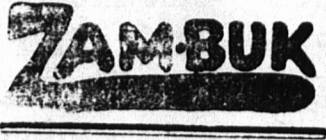

Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years of age, who has a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land for three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A hab table house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$200 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres cultivation in each of three years. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of tough, stony or stony land. Live stock may be a substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C. M. ince, 35 bulls, 116 rams and 11 boars. As the Secretary of one of the Institutes, there is one question that I think should receive attention of the Central Institutes, that is the best means of distributing these animals and the care they have. Quite a lot of questions have arisen in our own Institute and from what I can learn, the same is true of others. A good discussion on this subject should be helpful and I trust that this will not be overlooked.

In presenting this report, I wish to thank the Executive and officers and others who have helped to make the work of the Secretary as light as possible.

EVENING SESSION.

At the evening session Mr. J. A. Clark reported on the motion from King George Institute recommending that fares for picnics by rail to the Experimental Station be at same rate as those for Sunday School picnics. He said that the railway authorities would not agree to the proposal.

The general consensus of opinion was that \$1.50 per mile was prohibitive. If the railway agreed to a deposit of 50c the institutes could be sure of getting enough to defray the expense even if the day was stormy.

An interesting address was delivered by Prof. McCready on what was done in this matter in Ontario. A regular charge was made per mile but a rebate of 15c on the dollar was allowed. Mr. Giddings said that form (Continued on page seven.)

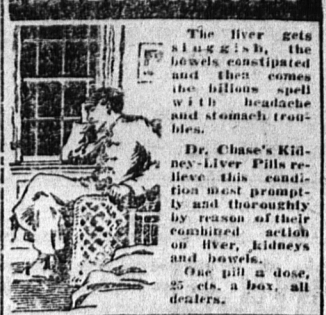
regret expressed by Dr Warburton at the unavoidable absence of Miss Stanway. Colonel Campbell said he was unable to express his appreciation and that of the officers and men of the 105th Highland Regiment for that magnificent gift. He accepted the gift and thanked the donors for their generosity. It was a useful costly and valuable gift. There was not any doubt that the field kitchen was essential to the well-being of an army. It had been said that "an army travels on its stomach," and that was true. An army that was marching found it very convenient to have its kitchen with it. It made all the difference to have it well or poorly fed. He must say all the children of the province had reason to be proud of their gift. He had been informed that all the pupils from the little tots of the kindergarten to the students of the College had contributed, so that the gift was representative of the whole of the young people of the province. On behalf of the Battalion he thanked everyone who had taken part in raising the fund, and especially Miss Stanway, who had done the most successful work to make the fund the success it had been. She deserved and received from every member of the 105th Regiment their heartfelt thanks. (Applause.)

His Worship Mayor Sterns said the school children had certainly much to be proud of. As His Honour said, the field kitchen was an essential in modern warfare, and this one would be used to much advantage at the front by our men. Every time our boys in the regiment had a hot meal at the front they would be reminded of the children of their Island home, and they would think kindly of the little children who had placed that useful gift at their disposal. (Applause.) Mr A. B. Warburton joined in regret at the illness of Miss Stanway which prevented her attending the ceremony. Still, though absent, she would be happy in the knowledge that that presentation was taking place. He did not know whether to congratulate the men or the children most on that gift. Perhaps he might compromise by congratulating both. It was as Col. Campbell had said, that battles were fought on the stomach, and the children of Prince Edward Island had done their part in seeing that the 105th Regiment were thus provided for. Addressing the Regiment, Mr Warburton said that it would go away in a month or two to fight in the cause of righteousness. He said the cause of righteousness rather than the national cause, advisedly, as he believed the cause for which the Allies were fighting was one of world righteousness. He congratulated the French population on the number of men they were contributing to the Regiment. Although they represented only 14 per cent. of the population yet they were enlisting in large numbers. (Applause.) On the call of Col. Campbell three hearty cheers were given for Miss Stanway and the children, and the proceedings concluded with the singing of the National Anthem.

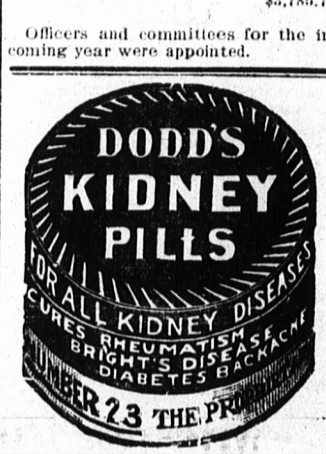
