THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 15.—Extreme dullness again marked the export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today there being little or no demand from any source. The trade in cash grain in the domestic market was also quiet but the undertone was steady. The local and export demand for spring and winter wheat grades of flour continued dull but values were firm. Prices for all grades of milled were well maintained under a moderate enquiry. A steady feeling prevailed in the market for standard grades of rolled oats but the demand was limited. A weaker feeling developed in the egg market and prices scored a decline of one cent per dozen. This was attributed to the liberal offerings. Fresh extras were quoted at 51 cents to 53 cents, firsts at 49 cents and seconds at 47 cents per dozen. The receipts were 2,465 cases. The potato trade was quiet but firm. Car lots of Prince Edward Island green mountains were quoted at \$1.75 to \$1.90 per bushel of ninety pounds and Quebec whites at \$1.30 to \$1.35 per bag of ninety pounds in bulk. A feature of the local butter situation was the easier feeling that developed and prices declined 1-4 cent to 1-2 cent per pound which was attributed to the increased offerings, at the 10c level. The demand showed a slight improvement. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 40 1/4 cents to 40 1/2 cents per pound. The receipts were 24 packages. The demand for cheese was again dull but values were unchanged. Western grades were quoted at 13 1/2 cents to 14 1/2 cents per pound. The receipts were 389 boxes.

Rates Requested by Truckmen's Union

The following is the petition presented to the City Council by the Truckmen's Union requesting an increase in trucking rates. Charlottetown, February 14th, 1927. To His Worship the Mayor, and Members of the City Council.

Gentlemen,—The members of the Truckmen's Union of the City of Charlottetown respectfully request that the following rates of truckage from railway cars be added to the present by-law respecting Truckmen and Truckage:

1.—On the East by the railway tracks; on the south by the water front; on the north by the South side of Kent Street as far as the East side of Pownall Street and on the West by the East side of Pownall Street, the rate to be 40 cents.

2.—On the South by the north side of Kent Street as far as the East side of Pownall Street and balance by Water front; on the north by the south side of Easton Street by Government Pond; on the West by Government Pond, Water front and Esplanade and on the East by the Railway tracks, the rate to be 50 cents.

3.—On the east by the railway tracks; on the south by the north side of Easton Street; on the west by the east side of Elm Ave. and on the north by the City boundary the rate to be 55 cents.

4.—On the east by the west side of Elm Avenue on the south by the north side of Easton Street to Brighton Shore; on the west and on the north by the city boundary, the rate to be 60 cents.

5.—Any other portion of the city
